



House passes pray and play resolution

WASHINGTON -The House of Representatives today passed without objection a resolution sponsored by Congressman Henry Bonilla (R-TX-23) defending the right to offer voluntary prayers before public school sporting events. Bonilla, introduced the bipartisan resolution in response to a federal court ruling barring the traditional prayers.

"This is big win for our team," said Bonilla. " The House has made its statement, but the championship game will be before the Supreme Court."

The bill, House Concurrent Resolution 199, was cosponsored by Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-TX-17) and several other representatives from both the Democratic and Republican parties. Bonilla praised the help he received from Stenholm, who Bonilla described as a "former high school football star."

The 5th US Circuit Court of Appeals ruled last February that prayers before public school athletic events are unconstitutional. Most notably, this ban has prevented students from praying before football games in an effort to promote fair play and sportsman-

Bonilla said, "Traditionally, before each game voluntary, nondenominational prayers have been held primarily to wish the players an injury-free game and to wish everyone a safe trip home on the road that night. 



I had a guy tell me the other unless he can get a head or neck shot. Says that way he either kills Well, maybe, and maybe not.

Let's say you have a shot at a deer at a hundred and fifty yards. With today's scope sighted rifles that is a pretty easy shot, especially if you are sitting in a deer blind with a solid rest. Now, on the way to the blind that morning you tripped over a rock and happened to bump your scope on another rock. Or maybe you banged it on the pickup door. It didn't hurt it much, but just bumped it off by about four inches (low) at a hundred and fifty yards. You take a fine bead on that deer's head, intending to stick him right behind the ear, and squeeze the trigger. The gun roars, the deer runs, and you never find him. What you have done is shoot off his lower jaw. He will now die very slowly and painfully of either infection or starvation. All of this because your rifle was just four inches low at the range you were shooting.
