

### School board witholds Briefs ... payment on new building By Dottie Cruz

Staff Writer

The Brackett Independent School Board of Trustees agreed, by unamious decision, to withhold payment of the balance owed on the new High School building.

The amount included the retainer fee to Greco Construction, general contractor for the build-

One of the main concerns was the air conditioning and heating system. According to school officials the air conditioning was not working properly and it was unknown whether or not the heaters were working.

"We have the heaters off, because we don't have enough variation between cooling and heating, so we really don't know about option" Andrews added. the heating," said Superintendent Taylor Stephenson.

"If we pay \$52,000 then that takes the pressure off Greco, then that leaves \$30,000 for the Air Conditioning Sub (Contractor), and we don't want to take the pressure off Greco," said Board President Lloyd Lee Davis, "Because that is who we are depending on to get the problems fixed."

"I have worked with Sam

(Contractor from Greco Construction), on previous projects and I've never known him to be the kind of contractor to leave the owner hanging," said Kerry

"The bonding company has an obligation to provide the building whether the contractor does or not, so if you hold even back the \$30,000 the bond is still in full

> "That (holding the balance), is our only leverage, we don't want to have to go to the point of having to go to the bonding company to get this resolved," said Davis.

The other issue the board had concerned the purchase and installation of cabinets in the Science

Although the cabinets were not in the original bid, they were included in the specifications.

"The mistake was not ours and it's just like building a home; if a contractor makes a bid on something then leaves something out, I don't feel obligated to pay it. Because he had all the specs," said Davis.

The board voted unamiously

not to pay for the cabinets. "Personally, I don't feel we are obligated legally or ethically to pay for those cabinets since they were in the specs," Davis added.

The majority of the funds are being provided by Judge Herb Senne. "I'm putting my own money into it, to get started,"

Senne's personal interest in the project stems from his son Shawn Senne's experience and knowledge, gained over the years raising Shawn, inspired him to bring this service within the boundaries of Kinney County. Not only on behalf of his son, but for anyone who needs the services Hill Coun-

try provides. "I'm trying to get a place for these folks that want to enter and be part of the program," said MHMR Center is a private insti-

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
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


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### Hummingbirds rely on feeders during Winter

AUSTIN, Texas — The arrival of a cold front in the fall often triggers a number of phone calls to Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPW) asking when should hummingbird answer is - don't.

to learn that hummingbirds will early winter." be found in Texas every month of says Mark Klym, TPW's Texas Hummingbird Roundup coordinator. "Last year our observers recorded 90 individuals from seven species 22 different counties in Texas."

According to Klym, wintering hummingbirds are found as far north as Dallas, as far west as El Paso and throughout the central and coastal counties. "Wintering birds were reported by 17 percent of our observers representing 45 percent of those that left feeders up all winter last year," he noted. "Your odds of seeing a winter hummingbird are quite good if you keep your feeders up. This year we are already getting reports of birds we associate with the winter season from many parts of the

By far the most common winter hummingbird is the Rufous hummingbird, a bird noted for its aggressive behavior at feeders. These migrants from the northwest are looking for a reliable source of food to replace energy they used on a long migration, according to Klym. In fact, both experts highly recommend that hummingbird fans augment their hummingbird feeders with plantings of native wildflowers, such as salvias, lantana's and native honeysuckles.






