

Suing for fun and profit

Last year, juries made some trial lawyers in our country very happy. The top ten verdicts. awarded in 1998 totaled \$2.8 billion. But of course, this is America, where we can always aim higher. Thus, some lawyers are now going after bigger and better awards. Their target? Gun manufacturers.

More than two dozen cities are suing gun makers, blaming the businessmen for the criminals who manage to get firearms illegally. Last week, the Administration announced it might try for a piece of this pie as well. The government has threatened the companies, saying that if they don't hurry up and settle the suits, the Department of Housing and Urban Development will file a lawsuit against them. HUD says it would be filing it on behalf of people who live in public housing

If the government gets its way, the firearms manufacturers will have to shell out billions of dollars to the cities, agree to stricter rules such as limiting the number of guns a person can buy, or both. For the past seven years, the Administration's been looking for a way to chip away at the second amendment. Congress didn't let it happen. Now the Administration's found a way around the Constitution. The lawsuit HUD's threatening would cost companies millions of dollars, win or lose, leaving them little choice but to compromise.

When I first heard about this idea last week, the idea of suing a company for selling and advertising a legal product seemed preposterous. The argument goes something like this: if someone misuses a product, we should blame the person who made it. But perhaps President Clinton's on to something. Next he might want to sue the car makers. After all, more people die in the United States every year in auto accidents than from gun injuries. But let's not stop there. Someone should tell the Administration what McDonald's has been up to. Day after day, they entice you to the golden arches with promises of piping hot, juicy would increase the reimburse- one knows a bad diet causes heart disease. 

The 1998 Texas hunting accident statistics support these actions. A total of only nine shooters involved in hunting accidents were graduates of the state's mandatory hunter education course. Even though hunter education is required in 49 of the 50 states and is required of Texas hunters born on or after September 2, 1971, most accidents are caused by people in violation of the law or who are not required to pass the course to legally hunt here. Certain exemptions in the law, such as a minor being able to hunt under adult supervision through age 16, weaken the assurance that every hunter will attend a hunter education course early enough in the learning process. Everyone is

encouraged to take the course regardless of age or requirements.
