Agents recover body

U.S. Border Patrol agents from the Carrizo Springs station recovered the body of a 68-year-old man from Mexico Saturday, May 20. A Justice of the Peace pronounced the man dead at 3:17 p.m. Cause of death was listed as dehydration. Authorities stress that crossing illegally into the United States can be extremely dangerous due to heat and drought conditions.

The U.S. Border Patrol strives to prevent the unncessary suffering and death of illegal immigrants. Area residents can report those in need of assistance by calling the Border Patrol toll-free at (888) 299-4402 (Del Rio Sector). \$4 million in cocaine seized

Border Patrol agents from the Eagle Pass station seized more than \$4 million in cocaine as the result of an immigratin stop May 17. Agents patrolling FM Road 1021 approximately nine miles east of Eagle Pass performed an immigration stop on a pickup suspected of smuggling illegal immigrants. A search of the vehicle yielded 150.6 pounds of cocaine in 53 packages. The cocaine was valued at \$4,819,200.

John Logam, commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, an organization of union veterans, ordered his group to decorate the graves of Union troops on a uniform date in 1868. These and other commemorations would give rise to the first national Memorial Day observance on May 30, 1868 at Arlington National Cemetery. Gen. James Garfield, keynote speaker for the observance, said those who lost their lives fighting for freedom engaged in the ultimate expression of humanity's "highest virtues." The general was right!

Recognizing a medical emergency is one of the first steps. Auto wrecks, chest pains or serious falls with broken bones signal emergency conditions to many people. But other situations are not so obvious. Call 9-1-1 immediately if any of these conditions are present:

- * Serious bleeding
- * Unconsciousness * Signs of a heart attack
- * Neck or spine injuries
- * Not breathing
- * Choking
- * Broken bones
- * Head, chest or abdominal


