After the curriculum, which consisted of three 30-minute lessons, the children took a report card home and made sure their families had working smoke detectors, a meeting place outside of the home in case of fire, a disaster supplies kit, and other

Williams, Matthews, and Texans some simple safety re- but as with any energy source, a propane gas cylinder if it shows precautions must be made to en- signs of internal damage such as "While it's easy to remember sure that it is used safely and cor- dents, gouges, bulges, fire damage, corrosion, leakage or excessive rust. Outdoor cooks should also make sure the propane cylinder is secured to the grill as directed by the manufacturer before starting any cookout.

Other safety tips to remember

include: Always open the grill hood before lighting and light according to the manufacturer's instructions. Never use gasoline or kerosene to start the fire

- Always grill in a well-ventilated area. Do not grill indoors or close to the side of a building.

- Use foil or a drip pan to catch juices and help avoid grease fires.

- To see how much propane is left in your cylinder, run a wet finger down the side. The wet streak will evaporate faster over the empty part of the cylinder.

- Since a hot grill is easier to clean than a cold grill, clean with a wire brush or scraper immediately after cooking, then wash off.

- To turn the cylinder valve on and off, remember "rightie tightie, lefty, loosey." After grilling, the cylinder must not be stored indoors or within any enclosed

The anniversary of Brigadier General John L. Bullis' death occurred recently and local historian, Lt. Col. (Retired) Bill Haenn presented a program to Rotarians about the general's service here. Lt. Bullis was stationed at Fort Clark as commander of the 24th Infantry, a Seminole-Negro Indian Scout Detachment.





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
