## Skyrockets with sticks, missiles with fins banned in unincorporated areas

Certain fireworks are restricted in unincorporated areas of Kinney County.


Those restricted fireworks are classified as "skyrockets with sticks" and "missiles with fins."

No person may sell, detonate, ignite or in any way use certain restricted fireworks in any portion of the unincorporated areas of the

Violators will commit a Class C Misdemeanor and may be fined as much as \$500.

Fireworks not prohibited under this Order are common fireworks, small in size classified as Class C explosives and large firework devices designed primarily to produce visible or audible effects by combustion, deflagration, or detonation and classified as Class B explosives.

A person commits an offense if he or she sells or intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly detonates, ignites, or in any way uses fireworks on a county road or in the right-of-way on a county road.
