

County proposes raises Briefs for most elected officials

Most of Kinney County's elected officials will receive at least 3.9 percent raises if the proposed budget for the 2000-01 fiscal year is approved.

The largest proposed increase is for the constable, whose salary will be raised 130.5 percent from \$4,337.97 to \$10,000.00.

If the budget is approved, the constable's travel expense will be lowered 75 percent from \$1908 to \$477. However the three new line items in that budget include: \$2000 for auto repairs, \$600 for telephone, and \$1250 for gas and oil.

The salary for county judge will from \$27,151.28 to \$28,210.18 increase from \$29,260.00 to and \$28,210.17 respectively. 30,401.14. Travel expenses are proposed at \$4,500, up 12.5 percent from \$4,000. The judge also receives a \$10,000 salary supplement, from the state, which is unchanged.

The sheriff's salary is proposed at \$29,553.32, up from the current salary of \$28,444.00.

Texas gets \$11.4 million

to fight drunken driving

The state of Texas will receive \$11,467,861 in federal funds to enforce the state's new 0.08 blood alcohol content law on drunken driving, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm reports. "These funds will go a long way towards making our streets safer in Texas. This is money which will save lives across our state by taking more drunk drivers off our roads," said Gramm.

The grant, from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, is part of the 2000 transportation appropriations bill. Under guidelines Gramm pushed through Congress, states which lower the blood alcohol content for DWI cases to 0.08 are eligible for grant funds. Texas recently passed legislation approving the new standard.



efits that will only be correctable by an increase in taxes or a cut in benefits. I don't believe either is a solution fit for America. And we don't need to adopt either if we begin working now to preserve Social Security. Congress has begun to address the immediate concern of saving Social Security for future generations. The most common suggestion is partial privatization. Partial privatization would allow workers to choose to invest a small percentage of Social Security payment as they saw best for their retirement. This would allow workers more freedom in planning for their retirement but would not do away with the current system. Evidence from the Social Security Administration shows that the rate of return, which is the amount of money you receive upon retirement from the taxes you pay into the system during your working years, has fallen every decade since its inception. Currently, the average rate of return under the Social Security system is far lower than investing in the safest standard U.S. Treasury bond. If workers were given the opportunity to invest a small percentage of their Social Security taxes, inevitably they would yield a greater return, thus providing a more secure retirement. Social Security has provided our grandparents and parents

with a safety net in their golden years and we are thankful for its generosity, efficiency and success. But we are now faced with tough decisions. If nothing is done to reform the current Social Security system there will be nothing left for our generation, more importantly, our children's generation and our grandchildren's generation. As Americans, let's trust one another to make the right decisions for our retirement by allowing for partial investment of our tax dollars without doing away with the system that took care of our parents and grandparents.

"If the landowner or lessee is feeding deer or quail by placing grain, salt or other feed on the ground or in troughs during or within 10 days prior to the dove season, this would be considered illegal baiting and they could be cited, Hellums warned. Lessees who wish to hunt doves over their quail or deer lease should cease all feeding before and during the dove hunting period. All deer or quail feed must be gone at least 10 days prior to the dove hunting.

Remember, too, that hunting in large groups can also lead to shooting over the daily bag limit. The daily limit for doves (during the regular seasons) in Texas is 15 birds, and once a hunter has reached the limit, it is unlawful to hunt for the remainder of the day. able effort to retrieve downed birds, Hellums said.
