> The Sheriff said that burglaries in Fort Clark and Brackettville have gone down this year, but that aliens have been causing trouble in the county. Recently a ranch house was robbed in the county, which had barred windows and locked doors; however, the burglars gained entry by actually cutting a huge hole in a wall. The house was a prefab and the outer walls consisted of a rather thin board, insulation and then sheet-An alarm system was triggered when the burglars entered a closet where the mechanism was located, and a small beep revealed it had immediately.

> The owners had a number of weapons in the house, 6 loaded shotguns and rifles and a loaded 9-millimeter pistol out on the dresser. The law enforcement people who arrived knew about the weapons, and Burgess joked about how it felt to go into that dark hole when they didn't know what awaited them.

He said the same kind of breakins are happening all over the county. He also said that many ranchers have burglar alarm systems that are excellent. 


