In writing the election story, which was a long one --- some 21 column inches of straight type besides the headlines --we tried to write it as interestingly as possible. That was a little hard to do in that the information was 90 per cent names and figures which get pretty dull after so long a time.

In an attempt, evidently, to break the monotony, when we got to the part in the story concerning the horseracing propositions we said that "Bovina voters were decidedly against horseracing." And that was pretty general, we'll admit.

We say all that to say this for the benefit of Brother John and all others who were possibly interested:

A total of 314 Bovina voters expressed an opinion on the proposition of legalizing parimutuel betting on horseraces. Of that total 79 were in favor of legalizing it and 235 were against. Since 439 people voted, that left a total of 125 who chose not to mark their ballots either

On proposition number two, which was for or against taxing pari-mutuel betting on horseraces, 89 were for the proposed method of taxation while 226 were against it.

# Rain Falls; Some Hail

Rain, marred in some areas south of Bovina by hail, came to Parmer County last week after a lengthy dry spell.

Most places in the immediate area had received an inch or more of moisture by time clouds went away Saturday

Showers, and the hail, began falling Wednesday, More came Thursday with the windup being on Saturday.

Bulk of the hail fell with the Wednesday rain, Several farmers south and east of Bovina suffered permanent damages to their wheat and in some cases young cotton and milo were wiped out. There is still sufficient time to replant the latter

No one farmer lost his entire wheat crop, according to reports, as the hail was scattered --- even in the areas which it struck. Highest estimated damage to any one field was 80 to 90 per cent. Most wheat which was in path of the hail storm was damaged to a lesser degree.

Religious bodies, ever interested in keeping up with the times, have been using movies, hi-fl. closed-circuit television and other modern educational devices. Now they are beginning to offer courses involving use of the teaching machine principle.

To help them on their way, As-

sociation Press, the YMCA's publishing division, has prepared an experimental book that works like a teaching machine. The first in a series of "step-

by-step" books, the initial publication is entitled "Step by Step in Theology," which will appear next week. In the fall, Association Press will issue a -step-by-step program for teaching the Old Testament and another dealing with the functioning of boards and committees. "Religious education leaders

have been asking for new kinds of materials with which to teach." a spokesman for Association Press said. "This kind of material seems to answer their needs, for it has been useful in

This first book, prepared by Hal and Jean Vermes, programming experts, is based on "First Steps in Theology," by the Rev. Dr. Jack Finnegan, of the Berkeley Divinity School. > Step by Step in Theology" is described by the publisher as a structor." In going through the the left-hand pages are upside down. Each page is divided into eight frames, four large and four small. The large frames pose vertically, A, B, C and D. 
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Meet a fellow Texan: Preston Smith.





Is it a good idea to buy two pairs of shoes of the same size for a child?

It depends on the age. When youngsters go out of their way to slosh through puddles and during the time when the puddles are of their own manufacture, it is almost necessary to have two pairs of shoes. It can be demonstrated that excessively long shoes weaken the arch, so it is better foot-health to have two pairs of the correct size than one pair which the child may or may not grow into before they are worn out. Later in childhood growth seems to be concentrated in the summer months.

In the fall when a child has outgrown all of his pairs I recommend one pair to be worn for everyday and Sunday, If the parents want another pair, I suggest that tell whether the second pair should be the same size or a half size larger.

tended an interesting program during the regional Texas Home Economics Association meeting in Amarillo. According to the business meeting we were informed that we have 180 known home economists in this upper Panhandle region.

It was interesting to visit with home economists of different professions. Attending were home economics teachers in high schools and colleges, dietiticians, counselors in home economics, home service advisers with electric and gas companies, and home de-

monstration agents. During the program we saw an interesting style show of good and poor results of laundering. For example one model wore a faded print dress that had been laundered in hot water with too much detergent. The other model wore another print dress of the same print and color, but her dress was brightly colored and appearing like new.

We saw a perfect example what happens if pockets are not checked before laundering. One model wore a pair of slacks and blouse that had been laundered with a tissue in one pocket. Extra brushing would be required to clear the lint from the

We also saw results of dingy white clothes that had been washed with colored garments. The other model wore pure white sports clothes that had been laundered with white items only. ments that had been washed in too high temperatures, too much detergent, not sorted into colored or white loads, or prepared for laundering by emptying pockets or removing stains.
