



Medicare Part B helps pay for doctor's visits, outpatient hospital treatment, and other medical by Medicare Part A.

The cost for the Part B premium is \$50 a month for 2001.

Beneficiaries with Medicare Part B who originally decided not to sign up for Part B when they can now take advantage of this opportunity (there is an additional 10 percent added to the premium for each year of prior eligibility).

Also, anyone who had Medicare Part B at one time, but 1998 U.S. Department of Comdropped out can now re-enroll.



# The road to the Capitol

The halls of our nation's Capitol are filled this month with students. Young adults from across America are given one week every Spring to break away from the books and take a rest from their classroom studies. Hundreds of these students choose Washington, D.C. as their travel destination.

I love this time of year. This week alone, I've met with dozens of students. We discuss everything from how a bill becomes a law to my favorite football team (the Cowboys, of course!).

A few days ago, a young man asked me a very pointed question that stuck in my mind, "How did you become a Congressman?" It's a simple question, but it made me think about my life at age 17.

When I was attending South San Antonio High School, I never thought that I would one day represent you in Washington as a United States Congressman. It was something of a feat for a student to graduate from my high school, let alone go on to college and beyond.

Most people assume congressmen have worn suits their entire life, and that a law or business degree is a required ticket of admission. However, Congress is full of self-made men and women who came from every background imaginable. Let me share a few examples with

At the young age of 20, Rep. Bob Riley of Alabama began selling eggs door to door with his brother. The small operation grew to become one of the largest totally integrated poultry and egg operations in the Southeast.

Rep. Ellen Tauscher of California was the youngest person to win a seat on the coveted New York Stock Exchange at age 25. She worked as a stock trader and investment banker. After moving to California she founded the ChildCare Registry, the first



In landscapes that have continuous brush, mechanical and chemical methods along with prescribed fire can be used to create interhabitat quality for many species spersed openings.

Brush management should be done on a landscape scale rather than a "pasture" scale. A managed landscape should contain the optimum structure, spatial arrangement and dispersion of habitat types needed by deer. Optimum habitat for white-tailed deer includes:

•  $\geq$  60% woody plant canopy on about 60% of the landscape;

 natural or artificially-created openings of 10-40 acres compromising about 40% of the landscape and surrounded by brush that provides screening cover; areas of diverse, dense brush with tall screening cover and > 85%woody plant canopy;

 areas of dense shade during summer and protection from cold in winter (thermal cover);

· areas of screening cover behind which deer are concealed

 brush-lined drainage areas that are continuous throughout the landscape, which can provide loafing and bedding areas and corridors for movement; and

 areas that provide deer food (browse, prickly-pear, forbs, and mastproducing plants).

The above seven characteristics of optimum habitat for white-tailed deer can be used as the basis in assessing deer habitat in South Texas.

If improvement is needed, brush management can be an effective tool for developing appropriate landscape characteristics for white-tailed deer.

By the time he was 23 years old he owned his own printing office and was the sole owner and printer of the Pennsylvania Gazette, a very popular and profitable newspaper of that day. 


