

Motor vehicle crashes still

cause about one of every three injury deaths in children. Estimates indicate that children aged 12 and under are up to 36 percent less likely to die in a crash if they are in the rear seat of the vehicle.

Recently in San Antonio, "Take a Back Seat for Safety," observed that about half of the children at one school arrived in the front seats of vehicles. Transporting your child safely should be your goal this summer.

The best place in a vehicle for with proper seatbelts and restraining devices. And while you're at 3743 it, why not set a good example as a role model and use your seatbelt, because seatbelts, when used, reduce the risk of fatal injury to front-seat passenger car occupants by 45 percent!

As summer approaches, children have increased risks of injury and death because of their summertime activities.

Here is some information about safety problems of "wheeled recreation" and children: in 1998, 203 children aged 14 and under died in bicycle-related crashes.

Bike helmets are 88 percent effective in reducing the risk of brain injury and have contributed to a 60 percent decline in death rates from bike accidents.

Since 1992, at least 37 children aged 14 and under died from inline skating injuries. Brain injury is the leading cause of sport- and recreation-related death

Nearly half of all children's sport- and recreation-related head injuries are caused by bicycle, skating and skateboard incidents. [I collected this information from Texas Department of Health and National Highway Traffic Safety Administration]

Thanks to TexCare Partnership, parents are reporting fewer visits to the emergency room and more visits to primary care physicians for routine care.

Judge Moreno's order calls for the management of care." full discovery in the landmark lawsuit accusing the HMOs of fraud, extortion, and racketeering. The ruling requires discovery be completed by early next year. Today's order follows an eight-hour hearing held on Monday.

"This order is a major step forward for America's physicians," said Archie Lamb, lead co-counsel for the doctors. "For years, doctors have fought the HMOs daily as they put corporate profits ahead of patient care. The discovery order will allow us the opportunity to prove that these companies engage in systemic attempts to cheat doctors, control medical decisions through non-payment, and manipulate the amount and provided.'

"This order must be creating havoc in the corporate headquarters of the giant, investor-driven HMOs," Rocky Wilcox, General Counsel for the Texas Medical Association, said. "This order will rip back the curtain and expose to

> "We believe that the evidence will paint an alarming and highly detailed portrait of what we have charged in these lawsuits," said Frank Staggers, M.D., president of the California Medical Association. "It will show that these plans have engaged in serious violations of federal anti-racketeering laws, that they have purposefully enriched themselves as part of a scheme to defraud physicians and their patients, and that they have been trying to force the physicians of America to do their dirty work."

"We have tried for years to resolve our concerns with the plans through endless discussions, on a case-by-case basis," David Cook, kind of necessary care General Counsel for the Medical Association of Georgia said. "Subsequently, we sought resolution through state legislation and active enforcement of those laws and even petitioned the United States Congress. We have arrived at this federal courthouse in Florida after futile and lengthy attempts to fix a mounting problem - as a last resort. But now that we're here, we are grateful that Judge Moreno has seen fit to allow us to turn the floodlights on the predatory exploitation of our physicians and their patients."

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
