

This was not an easy experience. The work was hard, the wool uniforms were hot in 100-degree weather, and the food was limited. Breakfast consisted of coffee and hardtack. If you were on a scouting expedition, it was hardtack and jerky. If you were on the fort, of some sort or something like stew.

A new career developed however. Erickson became knowledgeable about the accuracy of uniforms, guns, and such things from that historical driver was uninjured. 

Have you heard the news? This weekend the House of Representatives and Senate passed the largest tax cut in two decades. This tax cut is going to. touch every tax paying American. If you pay taxes, you're going to receive a tax cut.

This is big news for our country. The American family's tax burden has now reached its highest level since World War II. The average American is working 129 days a year just to pay off their total tax bill. And while America has not received. a tax cut since the Reagan Administration, we have received multiple tax increases in the same amount of time.

Starting in July of 2001, you're going to start seeing a difference in your paycheck. Many of you will receive refund checks later in the summer. And in the coming years our country will witness the repeal of the estate tax and reduction of the marriage penalty tax. You're finally going to get back some of the money you worked hard

I understand that with a tax cut of this size, there are many questions on your mind. How will it affect me? When will I see the changes? To make it a little easier, following is a break down of several aspects of the

 Marginal Rate Reduction: The tax cut will replace the old tax rate brackets of 15, 28, 31, 36 and 36.9 percent with a lower tax rate structure of 10, 15, 25, and 33 percent.

The new tax brackets will become effective January 1, 2001, and will be retroactive. This means that 95 million tax paying Americans will receive a lump-sum refund of \$300 for single taxpayers, \$500 for single parents and \$600 for married tax payers.
