



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

A sound energy policy

It seems everyone has been talking lately about the energy problems our nation is facing. Every time we head for the gas station or listen to the evening news we're faced with one very certain reality: we have a problem and we need to get to work on a solution.

Our nation's energy problem has been with us for quite some time. It's an issue that has been neglected over the last eight years, but thankfully it has been made a top priority by the new administration.

President Bush recently unveiled his new energy plan for the United States. His proposal is a commonsense balance of increased energy production and attention to environmental matters. It is a clear, comprehensive, and most importantly achievable plan.

The president's proposal is based on several elements that will provide a long-term answer to today's energy crisis. But most importantly, it focuses on our nation's dependence on foreign oil. The fact is: America has become way too dependent upon a handful of foreign countries for our energy needs. Sixty percent of our oil comes from other countries. This is simply bad policy. By relying on countries that see us as a needy customer, we leave our national security vulnerable to the whims of foreign nations. Take Iraq, Iran and Libya for an example. Should these nations cut production, we would risk serious cutbacks in our energy supply. This would result in even higher prices at the pump, more blackouts and other serious energy problems.

The answer to our energy crisis is lessening our dependence on foreign oil. President Bush outlined a plan that will increase U.S. production, make it more profitable to drill and produce oil in America and thus lessen our dependence on other countries.

In order to make this plan a reality, we must consider new sources of energy that can be produced on our own soil. The first of many steps is drilling for oil in Alaska. This is a sure-fire way to garner new energy. Of the nineteen million acres in the Alaska National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR), only around 2,000 acres would be affected. That is an area roughly the size of a small airport.

What the president is proposing is opening only a small fraction of the ANWR for environmentally sensitive oil and gas exploration. The expected output of oil would equal 30 years of oil imports from Saudi Arabia and almost 60 years of Iraqi oil

New pipelines are also needed in order to carry natural gas. We need an estimated 38,000 miles of new pipelines to move enough fuel to supply our energy needs. And we must repair and upgrade entire transmission grids, as well as add new ones, in order to meet the energy demand we face.

Finally, Vice President Cheney said last week that in order to lessen our dependence on foreign oil, we would need to build almost two-thousand new power plants. Building twothousand energy plants may be a lofty goal, but it gets the point across. We need to look for new solutions to our problems.

As we prepare for the summer season with air conditioning and more vacation driving, we need to pay serious attention to our energy policy and make some substantial changes. I think that President Bush's proposal is a step in the right direc-

Solving our energy problems will be a long journey. We have the ability to diminish America's dependence on foreign energy. It is time that we do the right thing-for our children and for the future of this great land of


