ONE OF THE TOPICS which we have brought up occasionally in this column was espoused in a couple of other places this week. Maybe it is an idea whose time has come...or will come someday, if we ever decide that tradition is worth breaking.

The topic to which we refer is the "secession" of the Panhandle area from the rest of the state.

The latest champion of this cause is Buck Ramsey, who argues in its favor in the current issue of "Accent West," a magazine which preaches the virtues of the Amarillo area.

Ramsey points out that back as early as 1853, Governor Elisha Pease had drawn up his own plan for dividing up the state, and began trying to sell it off to the Federal Government for use as an Indian Reservation.

Fortunately for us, he did not succeed, but unfortunately, as Ramsey points out, this attitude toward the Panhandle seems to have held sway downstate ever since.

Ramsey's tongue-in-cheek article points out that if such a new state were created, the traditional southern boundary would be a line roughly from Lazbuddie to Kress to Quitaque. "But we might want to drop down another tier of counties, and make the boundary posted by Maple, Lum's Chapel, Roaring Springs and Chalk," Ramsey says.

He points out that the proposed 51st state would not be a great populated area, containing an estimated 430,400 souls according to recent estimates. That would rank it only 49th, ahead of Alaska and Wyoming—we'd be one of those sparsely populated western states.

Area-wise, the new state, dubbed "Cheyenne" by the magazine would contain 31,289 square miles, and this would be close to "average" in size, ranking 39th, ahead of such states as South Carolina and West Virginia.

You may or may not know it, but the state of Texas, under the treaty by which it entered the union in 1845, retained the right to divide up into as many as five states. This possible re-division apparently was one of the major topics taken up by the state legislature during the first 50 years of statehood, but gradually dwindled as a popular item, as Texans no doubt became "size conscious."

We might not gain any stature in Washington, but it would be a foregone conclusion that we'd have more political clout in the new state capitol. And where would that be? Why, in Washburn, according to Ramsey, which would be the exact center of the new state. Washburn is a small community just east of Amarillo.

THE SAME DAY we read Ramsey's article, we happened to be listening to KGNC radio when their "Spectrum" series from CBS was broadcast, and lo and behold, the possibility of carving up of states was the topic for that particular editorialist.

The radio personality pointed out that creating new states is a topic of conversation in at least five states. He mentioned California, Florida, New Jersey and Michigan in addition to Texas. He mentioned Texas' unique five-way proviso, so apparently the secret is out.

California has, due to its extreme length, a North-South situation, with population centers for each. Florida has an East-West difference of opinion, with a Panhandle of its own. Michigan has a natural division, with Lake Michigan dividing the state not quite in half.

New Jersey residents have circulated a petition asking for a proposition to place the voters on the matter of dividing. So, this may be the first real "test case."

What will the U.S. map look like in 20 years? Will it be the same, or have some changes? Tune in around July 1, 2000, and we'll tell you.

"After his death, I moved back to Friona, where we were married, to be close to my sister, Laverne Burrow. Shortly thereafter, I started receiving notices from the Stonewall Historical Commission urging me to write our

family history and mail it so we would be included in the Stonewall County History book. I just kept putting it off until it was too late. Now, the book is out and our family isn't represented in it.

"I have nothing to hand down to our grandchildren and friends showing what we did for the county where we lived and worked so long.

"I am sorry that I did not respond to the letters sent to me. Since we were married here and I live here now, I plan to contribute to the Parmer County History book, and urge all others who live here now or have lived here in the past, to do likewise."

## County Re-Invests Right-of-Way Funds

Re-investing of \$80,000 in county right of way funds and awarding of a contract for a new tractor and shredder for Precinct 3 highlighted the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners on Monday, June 23.

County Treasurer Benna Felts discussed the standing of several Certificates of Deposit belonging to the county.

The court passed a motion to reinvest an \$80,000 certificate from the county's right of way fund for a period of four months. Another \$10,000 was invested in a CD, from money which had been set aside for Social Security payments. The certificate will mature on September 26, 1980.

## Ellen Estes Gives State GOP News

Ellen Estes of Bovina, County Republican chairman, attended the recent Republican State Convention in Houston as a delegate, and reports that the meeting was very harmonious and showed that the state is becoming a strong two-party force in politics.

Also attending from Parmer County were Clarence Mason and Frank Hinkson of the Lazbuddie area. Huston Hoover of Bovina was also a delegate, but was unable to attend.

The Parmer County residents were part of over 3800 delegates who attended the meeting from across the state.

"All of the resolutions passed were very conservative in nature. We also felt that the resolution passed on agriculture was as good a resolution as we could ask for. We were very pleased with the convention," Mrs. Estes said.

"We were in session from 9 a.m. until after 10 p.m. It was a busy day," Mrs. Estes said.

Speakers at the state GOP meeting included Governor Bill Clements, Senator John Tower and Representative Jack Kemp, whom

Mrs. Estes described as "very dynamic." She also attended a county chairmen's luncheon on Thursday of the meeting, at which Rep. Barry Goldwater III of California was featured speaker.

"I think the Republicans are growing in strength in Texas. All of the delegates elected to the national convention were Reagan delegates. It was the feeling at the convention that Reagan is the 'man of the hour,'" Mrs. Estes said.

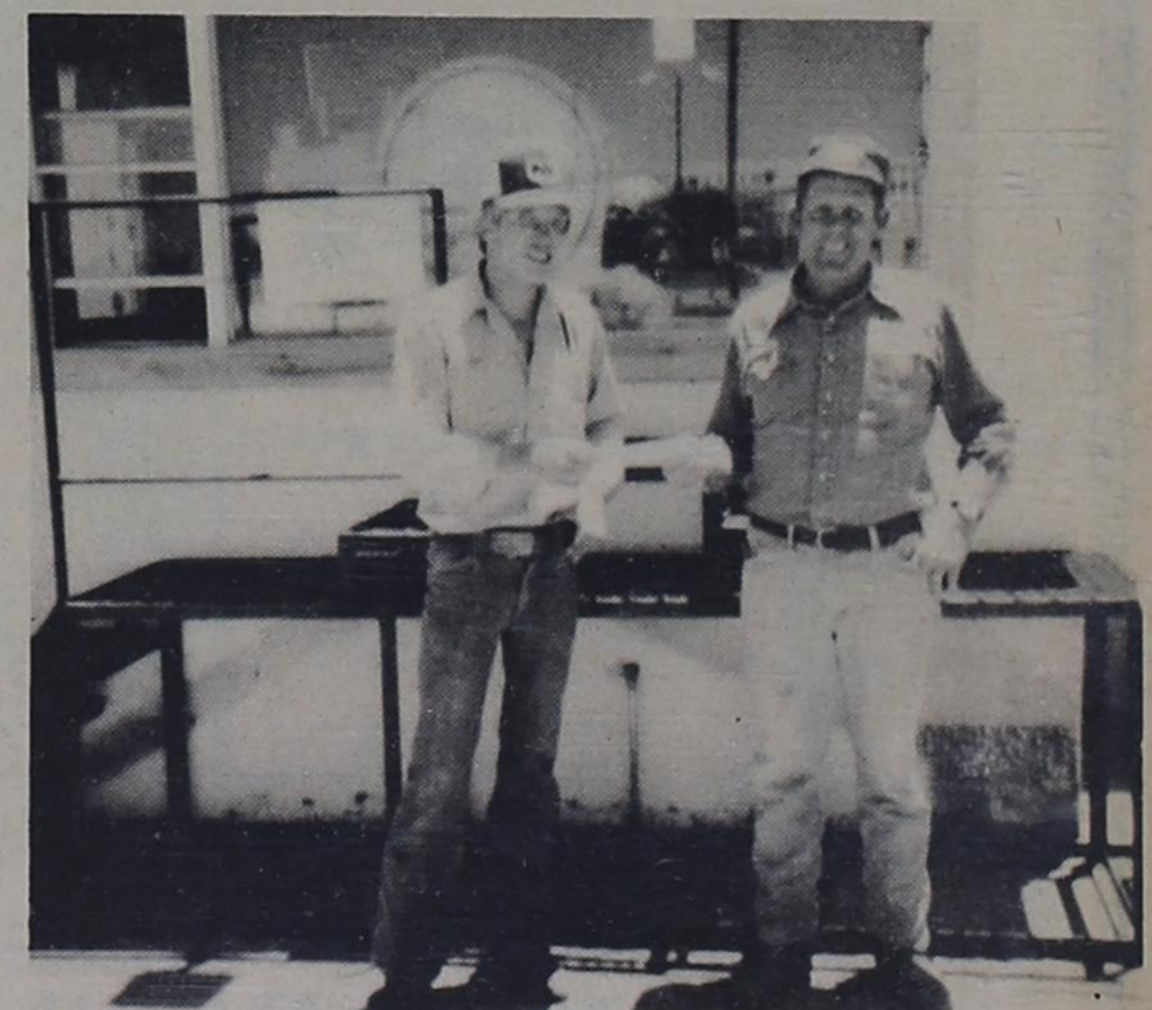
In all, the convention passed 17 resolutions on to the national convention.

They concerned agriculture, appointment of federal judges, busing, education, energy, Equal Rights Amendment (opposing further time extension), federal budget and national defense.

Also, a resolution opposing adoption of a national health insurance program, one supporting pro-life, one to reduce taxes, supporting the right to bear arms, supporting right to work, traditional families, voluntary prayer for students and reform of welfare.

The groom's parents were hosts for the rehearsal dinner, which was held in the Fellowship Hall of the church.

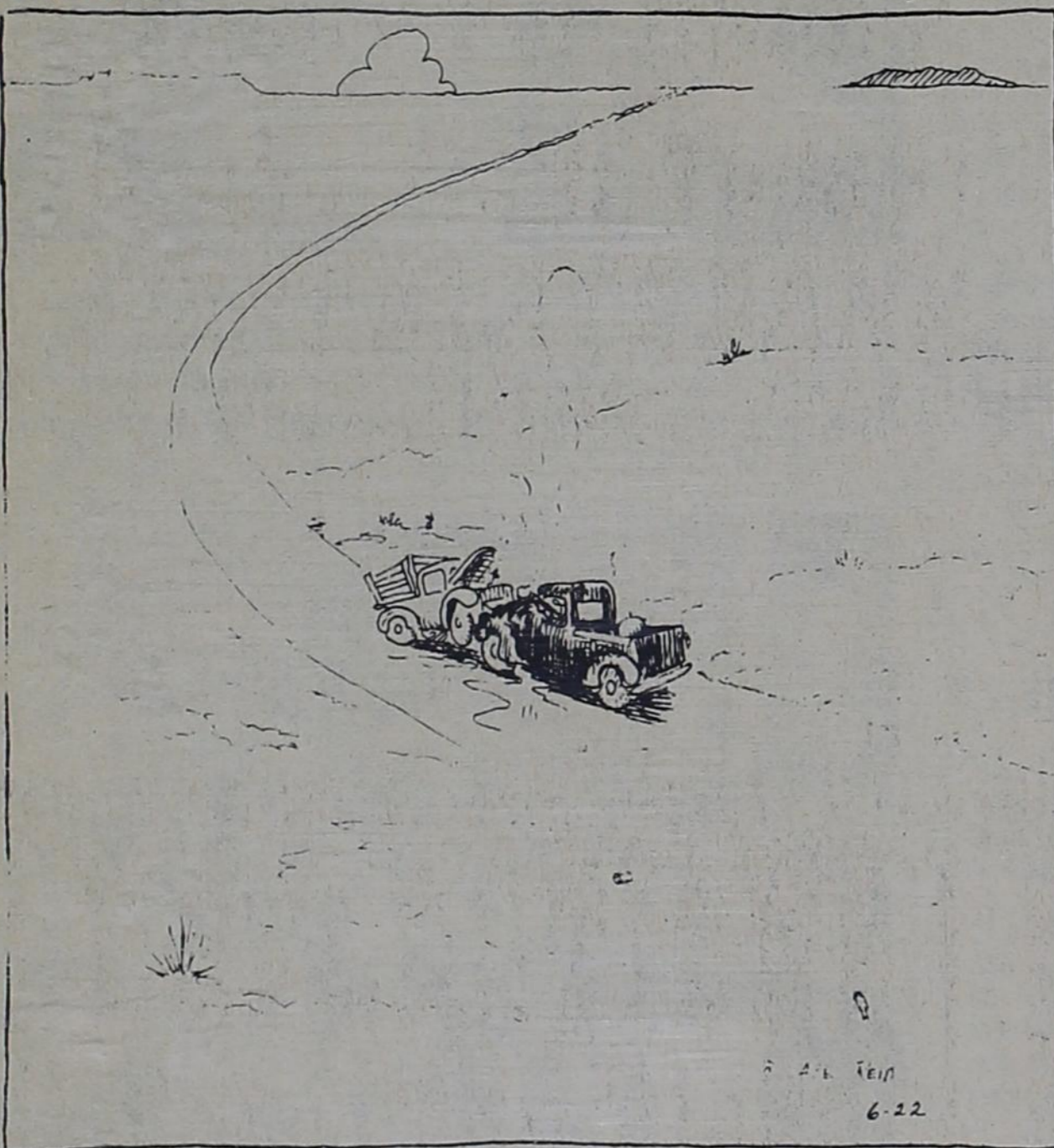

During the eight-week training cycle, he studied general military subjects designed to prepare him for further academic and on-the-job training in one of the Navy's 85 basic occupational fields.

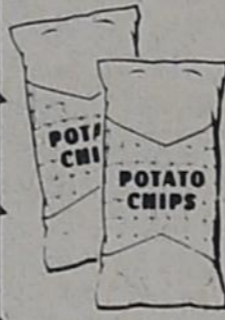
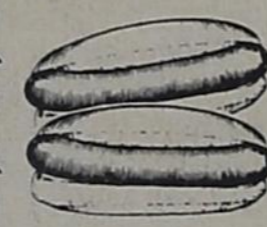
Included in his studies were seamanship, close-order drill, Naval history and first aid.
