'Terrorists will not slow us down'

Washington D.C.- U.S. Representative Henry Bonilla sent a strong message today to the constituents of the 23rd district: "Terrorists will not slow us down." We'll continue answering our phones, checking our email and responding to constituent correspondence. Many members of my staff will work from home and other non-government offices. FILING REQUIREMENTS FOR CANDIDATES FOR **INITIAL DIRECTORS**

The Temporary Board of Directors of the Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District announce an election to be held on January 12, 2002, for the purpose of confirmation of the Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District and Election of the Initial Directors.

The seven positions to be filled are: Three Initial Directors at large elected by the voters of the entire district and One Initial Director from each County Commissioner's precinct by the voters of that precinct.

To be eligible to be a candidate for or to serve as an Initial Director at large, a person must be a registered voter in the district and:

- for Position One, reside in the District;
- (2) for Position Two, reside in the City of Brackettville; and
- for Position Three, reside in the Fort Clark Springs Municipal Utility District.

To be eligible to be a candidate for or to serve as an Initial Director from a County Commission's Precinct, a person must be a registered voter of and reside in a rural area of that precinct.

A person shall indicate on the application for a place on the ballot the position on the Board for which the person is a candidate.

Any person wanting to be a candidate for one of these seven positions may obtain an application at the Office of the County Judge, at the Kinney County Courthouse, Brackettville, Texas, Monday - Friday (except holidays), 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. The application will be accepted Mondays and Fridays from 9:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. and Wednesdays 2:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m. The application must be received by Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District in the Office of the County Judge by 5:00 p.m., November 28, 2001.
