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

A mother leans into the backseat of her SUV. She buckles the seatbelt around her oldest daughter and adjusts the car seat for the baby. Finally she climbs into the drivers seat. Confidently, she begins to head out of the driveway and off to soccer practice.

This mother is confident. She knows that her children are protected and safe in the vehicle she drives. Last week we narrowly escaped having this right taken away. The right to choose safety and comfort in a vehicle came under close fire.

You see, some people in Washington believe the government has the right to decide what type of car you drive. I am referring to an attempt by the Senate to raise corporate average fuel economy standards (CAFÉ) in vehicles.

We are all interested in predecreasing our dependence on foreign fuel. But these measures should not come at the expense of jobs and lives. Now more than ever, we should be watching over American jobs and the American economy. Raising CAFÉ standards would do more harm than it's proponents care

They struggled with the arid, unhospitable land and nearly starved. The news of the Goliad and Alamo disasters in March 1836 led to the final abandonment of Delores. The colony failed for several reasons; lack of money, inadequate research and planning, and, one could say, the selfishness of some of the leaders of the colony and the land company. Although the colonists continually feared attack by the Comanches, the Indians never attacked them. However, when the last small group of colonists left Delores they were attacked by the Comanches on April 4.






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"We have seen a steady increase in the number of people coming onto the Kidney Health Program at the Texas Department of Health (TDH) with diabetes as the primary cause of kidney failure," said Phillip Walker, Chief hands; of the Bureau of Kidney Health Care. In 2001, more than half the program applicants (53 percent) had a primary diagnosis of diabe-

Following diabetes, hypertension, or high blood pressure, is failure for Texans. Last year, 23 Program applicants had a primary diagnosis of hypertension.

"In Texas, more than 30,000 people have chronic kidney failure, or end-stage renal disease," Walker said. Nationally, about 20 more are at risk.

According to the National Kidney Foundation, more than 50,000 new patients each year will require kidney dialysis or kidney transplants to live.

With diabetes, the body does not produce or properly use insulin. It is insulin that regulates the amount of glucose or sugar in the blood; and without it, the body is unable to convert glucose to energy, leaving large amounts of sugar in the blood.

Eventually, small blood vessels in the kidneys become damaged by a scar-like material that builds up on the capillary walls of the kidneys, leading to kidney damage. High blood pressure can damage kidneys by constricting blood vessels, cutting off the blood supply to the kidneys and starving them of oxygen and nutrients.

> About 10 percent to 20 percent of infected people die, many within hours of the first symptoms. Others may suffer complications such as brain damage, blindness, loss of hearing, kidney failure or amputations. With proper treatment, however, many people recover fully.

The bacteria lives in the noses Nausea often accompanied by and throats of humans, usually without making people sick. The incubation period, or time between exposure and development of symptoms, ranges from two to 10 days but is typically three to four days.

TDH and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevent do not recommend restricting travel, school or group gatherings such as at sporting or cultural events when meningitis occurs in the community. "The risk is very small in those settings because transmission of the bacteria requires very close exposure," Hendricks said.

A vaccine that protects against four strains of meningococcal meningitis is available for people over age 2 but is not routinely given in the United States. It is not helpful for treating close contacts of cases because it takes at least two weeks for the protection to begin. In addition, the vaccine's protection lasts only a few years; and if a person ever needs to be vaccinated again, the immune system may not respond as well the

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Investment Guidelines For All Seasons Financial Focus by Joaquin Davis

It's finally spring - at least according to the calendar. As we move into a new season, you may adjust your lifestyle, your schedule and even your wardrobe. But no matter what time of year it is, some things shouldn't change such as your investment guidelines.

Of course, everyone's financial situation is different. Your needs, goals, tolerance for risk and time horizon are all different from those of your neighbors and co-workers. And yet, when it comes to intelligent investing, there are some "universals" — common sense rules that can work for everyone.

Here are a few of these guidelines: Rebalance your portfolio - Every year or so, it's a good idea to review the mix of stocks, bonds and cash instruments in your portfolio. For example, as you get nearer to retirement, you may want to move some investment dollars from "growth" instruments to income-producing assets. Lower your risk — Examine your portfolio for low-quality fixed-income investments or ultra-risky stocks. If you find them, give some thought to making some adjustments. In any market climate, you can purchase high-quality investments with reasonable levels of risk. Your investment professional can help you find these vehicles and then discuss the consequences of mak-

ing adjustments. Review your cash balance - It's always a good idea to have from six months' to one year's worth of living expenses available in a highly liquid vehicle, such as a money market account. But beyond that, if you have too much "cash" in your portfolio, you may be depriving yourself of opportunities for long-term growth or current income. Once you're sure you have cash set aside for emergencies, put the rest

to work for you. Never stop investing - When is the best time to invest? Today, no matter what's happening in the market at any given point, you will always have goals you want to meet — college for your kids, a comfortable retirement, etc. If you are going to meet these goals, you must invest consistently. And the sooner you start investing, the more time you will have for your money to

potentially grow. Diversify — At any given time, you'll find different classes of investments moving in different directions. Stocks may be up, while bonds are down. Or growth stocks may be up, while international stocks are down. Or municipal bonds may be up, while government-sponsored, mortgage-backed securities are down. You simply can't afford to put all your dollars in any one type of investment. By spreading your money around a variety of vehicles stocks, bonds, treasuries, etc. - you'll take advantage of the asset classes that are prospering, while cushioning the impact of the ones that are slumping. By following these few basic guidelines, you'll help position yourself for investment success - winter, spring, summer and fall

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
