Houston - Hormone replacement therapy isn't just for women. Men of all ages can experience a shortage of androgen hormones, such as testosterone, causing loss of sex drive, impotency, muscle weakness and fragile bones.

"The benefits and risks depend on the patient's age," said Dr. Glenn Cunningham, chief of endocrinology at Baylor College of Medicine.

For androgen-deficient men, hormone-replacement therapy can help strengthen libido and prevent osteoporosis. Pills to treat androgen deficiency have been available for years, but the large doses required to be effective can be toxic to the liver, and testosterone shots can be pain-

Cunningham advises taking a blood test, and consulting a physician to determine if the therapy is right for you.

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
