There were 5,404 total apprehensions made in the Del Rio Sector, including 2,046 in Eagle Pass, 1,056 in Carrizo Springs, 581 in Del Rio, 329 in Uvalde, 145 in Comstock, 135 in Abilene, 131 in San Angelo, 85 in Llano and 73 in Rocksprings.

Agents in the Del Rio sector seized 4,725.87 pounds of valued marijuana, \$3,780,697.
