

Investigation results in arrest of two men in Fort Worth

Two North Texas men were arrested last week after law enforcement officials discovered a methamphetamine laboratory in Kinney County.

at approximately 9 p.m. on Sept. 30 in Fort Worth in possession of one pound of methamphetamine with an estimated street value of \$51,520.

A 30-year-old female companion with Edmunds and Fox was questioned and released pending further investigation.

The two men remain in the Tarrant County Jail on charges of possession of methamphetamine over 400 grams. The charge carries a punishment of 10 to 99 years or life and a \$100,000 fine.







Water district hires new legal counsel

Brian Sledge has been named new legal counsel for the Darlene Shahan, Cecil Smith, Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District.

Sledge is an attorney with the law firm of Lloyd, Gosselink, Blevins, Rochelle, Baldwin and Townsend of Austin.

The Board of Directors agreed to pay Sledge at a rate of \$190 per hour. The district has \$12,000 budgeted for legal and professional fees, which is enough to pay Sledge for just over 63 hours of work during the fiscal year.

"I'm sure that seems like a lot of money in Kinney County -

it seems like a little bitty bit of money in Austin, Texas," Sledge said.

Board members Don Hood, Hadley Wardlaw and Bob Young voted to allow the interim general manager to execute an employment agreement with the law firm to represent the district.

Zach Davis was in opposition of the agrement. He said he was not aware of the agenda item until the morning of the special meeting. The original agenda was modified after being published in The Brackett News and the Del Rio News-Herald.
