Herndon: Controversy divides local citizens

The debate over the water in Kinney County made it to the state capitol last week.

A number of local citizens gave testimony in Austin as the Natural Resources Committee discussed Senate Bill 1886, addressing the Kinney County Groundwater Conservation Dis-

Tootsie Herndon, mayor protem of Spofford, said she was embarrassed by the debate, adding that the community has been divided and that local citizens were referred to as "the Hatfields and the McCoys."

"Our own water board has lost credibility in this process because the (water marketers) have attacked them through local citizens," she said. "It really bothers me that they have run the Shahan's name down. This is terrible.

"We need to bring credibility back to the Shahans and to our local water board because we are the ones who elected these people to represent us."

Herndon made her comments while addressing the Commissioners Court Monday.

Local businessman Wes Robinson took exception to Herndon's comments during the Commissioners Court meeting.

"I can tell you personally, I've attended most of the meetings, and if this board has been discredited, they've done it through their own actions," he said. "I would strongly urge you not to fly to support a board that will not accept input from the general public or that refuses to be fiscally responsible.
