Mayor resigns

Carmen Berlanga verbally resigned as mayor of Brackettville Tuesday night after citizens continued to express dissatisfaction with the city's financial woes.

The community has been in an uproar since learning in May that the city was over \$200,000 in debt and that cash assets had decreased by 97 percent.

The City Council fired David Luna as city manager last month, but citizens argued that Berlanga, as the city's mayor and chief executive officer, was responsible for the city's financial situation.

"You keep saying that David was in charge, but you are the mayor — you are responsible for everything that has happened," said local businesswoman Genie Robinson. "Frankly, I would like to ask for your resignation."

"You may have it," Berlanga replied. "You can come in and the managing of the employees, try to get it all together, work with the auditors, work with the CPA, work with attorney, work with the investigators — it's all your's, honey.

"I'm out. You asked for my resignation and for me to step zens is the city's debt to West down. I'm gone. Thank you very much," added Berlanga, who has served as mayor for 11 years.


According to state law, the mayor's resignation must be in writing and signed by Berlanga before it becomes effective.

If Berlanga does resign in writing, the vacancy can be filled by appointment of the City Council or by a special election.

The city's debt had grown to do the bookkeeping, the payroll, \$220,239.99, but Berlanga reported Tuesday night that the amount owed had been cut by 36 percent to \$140,565.85.

Christopher will be the third international exchange student to attend Brackett High School. He will be arriving from Germany in less than three weeks.



Unwanted telemarketing calls are annoying and all too common. When you are sitting down to dinner, or helping your kids with their homework, the last thing you want to deal with is a call from a stranger with a sales

Congress, along with President George W. Bush, has just established a way to protect you from bothersome telemarketing

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has joined with the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) to create a National Do Not Call Registry.

This registry is a tool that will help ensure that telemarketers respect the privacy of our nation's citizens.

The National Do Not Call Registry will allow people to limit most unwanted telemarketing calls by registering their home or cell phone numbers. Registration can be completed by phone or over the internet, and it is free of charge.

The service also comes at no expense to the taxpayers, as it is fully funded by the telemarketing industry.

As you may know, this past February Congress passed the Do-Not-Call Implementation Act which authorized the FTC to collect fees for non-compliance that will be used to maintain the National Do Not Call Registry.

Zach Davis, a former board member, asked if copies of the proposed management plan would be made available to the



Directors discuss enforcement issues

The Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District Board of Directors discussed enforcement of its rules last week during its monthly meeting.

Steve Walthour, interim general manager, said he was reviewing the district's authority and would present different enforcement programs to the directors at the next board meeting.

"At that time, we can go through different kind of enforcement issues," said Walthour, who also works as a permitting enforcement manager with the Edwards Aquifer Authority in San Antonio.

Director Bob Young asked if any enforcement action by the district would have to go through the courts.

"At the Edwards Aquifer Authority, going through and finding out what the potential violation is, and then talking to the alleged violator, we find that many times most people want to comply with our rules. If we bring a non-compliance issue to their attention, they generally jump on it and try to correct it.

"For example, you have a deadline for fees. If you haven't paid your fee by the deadline, as far as activity is concerned," you're not in compliance and it he said. 

Haenn shares passion for oil lamps

Local historian Bill Haenn spoke about his hobby at last week's Brackettville Rotary



The Daughters of the Republic of Texas' Library Committee recently featured John Sellers in an all-day seminar on researching family history at Alamo Hall on the Alamo Complex in San Antonio.

"History's Role in Your Genealogical Pursuits" was Sellers' topic. His theory is that one needs to understand family life, laws, culture and ethnicity in able to successfully pursue one's

"Revisiting our high school and college history lessons can benefit our genealogical research," he said. "Also, the knowledge of social history, history from the bottom up, can help us solve the proverbial brick walls."

Sellers said that it is important to know the history of the locations where your ancestors were, such as when that state was admitted to the Union and its previous status; how it was settled and by whom; the particular laws regarding land, probate, etc.; state land versus federal land states; when the county of your research was created and the genealogy of the surrounding counties.

Clues to your family can often be found in historical events, such as the major wars in American history: the Revolutionary War, 1775-1783; the War of 1812, 1812-1815; the Mexican War, 1846-1848; the Civil War, migration were the historic land 1861-1865; the Spanish-American War, 1898; and American involvement in World War I, 1917-1918.
