Water board to consider raising fees and tax rate today at public hearing

By J.J. GUIDRY Editor

Kinney County Groundwater District officials are considering raising user fees as they prepare to adopt a new budget.

The board will hold a public hearing on the district's budget, tax rate and fee schedule today at 4 at the Courthouse.

The directors voted to keep the same groundwater use fees during a special meeting Monday. The fees include \$1 per acrefoot of water per year for agriculture use and \$10 per acre-foot of water per year for all other

The current permit application fees include \$200 for applications seeking 100 acre-feet of water per year or less and \$500 for more than 100 acre-feet.

Board member Darlene Shahan proposed that the district change the fees to the actual cost of processing the applications.


