

# County raises tax rate


The Kinney County Commissioners Court voted 4-1 Monday to increase its tax rate 11.94 percent. No citizens chose to address the tax rate or the new budget during a public hearing.

County Judge Herb Senne and Commissioners Joe Montalvo. Pat Melancon and Francie Wylie all voted for the budget and increased tax rate, while Commissioner Nat Terrazas opposed both issues.

The budget for the upcoming fiscal year totals \$2,310.032.87.

"During the seven-plus days of workshops and fiscal planning, every line item in the proposed budget was closely scrutinized for need, applicability and practical use in providing public services," Senne said. 'No stones were left unturned. Many line items were cut out, some were totally deleted and none were significantly increased.

"Departments experienced, not one, but two rounds of significant reductions. Except for longevity pay, an allocation for tenure, neither raises nor costof-living adjustments were awarded to anyone. No department came out a winner and none appeared very satisfied or very happy. Cuts were severe, but both necessary and sensible."

## Why are elected officials raising their salaries and cutting county services?

Most of you have probably heard or read that the county commissioners passed next year's budget this past Monday. The budget included an 11.94 percent road and bridge tax increase.

The budget and tax rate passed by a 4-1 vote. Commissioner Nate Terrazas opposed both items. No citizens made any comment during the public hear-

Some of you may recall I wrote a column about the county's previous budgets about a month ago. I started doing a little research after reading this year's public notice on officers' salaries and found some interesting facts.

While department heads faced two rounds of cuts to balance the budget, with the exception of three commissioners, all Kinney County elected officials own conclusions. received raises. All of those raises included longevity compensation.

Why are we paying elected officials longevity compensation? Do we really need to encourage elected official to run again by providing longevity compensation? I don't think so!

In my opinion, longevity compensation should be reserved for faithful employees, not elected officials. If an elected official doesn't like the compensation, they don't have to run for the office.

Why are we keeping the county's portion of the judge's and county attorney's salaries at the same level when they are receiving increases in their state


The really interesting part is those increases occurred in a \$330,578 deficit budget. I told you in my last column, "Sorry, I just can't understand the reasoning behind these decisions."

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



## Deliciously moist poppy seed cake can be adopted for diabetics with ease

My son, who is a certified chef, sent me this recipe for a deliciously moist poppy seed cake that can be adopted for diabetics with ease. There is no reason not to make it into muffins if so desired.

**Poppy Seed Chiffon Cake** 21/2 cups all purpose flour

- 1 cup sugar (or a substitute)
- ½ teaspoon salt 34 cup water
- ½ cup vegetable oil 5 large egg yolks
- 1 teaspoon lemon extract
- 1 teaspoon lemon zest 1 12½-ounce can poppy seed

7 egg whites, room tempera-

1/2 teaspoon cream of tarter

**Lemon Butter Frosting** 6 tablespoons butter or margarine, softened

4 cups xxx sugar 3-5 tablespoons milk

1 teaspoon lemon extract 1 tablespoon lemon juice Mix the flour, sugar, baking powder and salt together. Add water, oil, egg yolks, lemon ex-

tract, lemon zest and filling, and

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In a large glass or aluminum bowl, beat the egg whites and cream of tartar until stiff peaks form. Fold into batter and pour mixture into an ungreased 10inch tube pan and bake at 350 degrees for 55 to 60 minutes or until the cake springs back from a light touch. Invert pan on a bottle, cooling completely, before removing from pan.

Frosting: Cream the butter and sugar well, then add remaining ingredients. Beat until smooth. Yields 12 to 16 slices.

For diabetics: In place of this frosting, I sprinkled approximately half of a package of lemon Jello (sugar free, 3-ounce size) and a light dusting of xxx sugar, which worked well.

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
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


