



Does what your children see on television have any influence on their behavior? If they see casual sex, hear foul language and watch hours of bloody mayhem on the boob tube, do you think it changes the way they see their world?

If you say no, they know the difference between fantasy and reality, you would be only half right. The most recent studies reveal that what children see on television has a frightening impact on how they behave.

For instance, the following is copied from a report produced by Parents Television Council (PTC): "Recently, 24 state attorneys general sent a letter to Jack Valenti, the president of the Motion Picture Association of America urging him to persuade curse words fall into the catthe industry to try to cut back on cigarette smoking in movies in an effort to reduce the appeal of cigarettes to teenagers. Underlying this letter is recognition of the fact that teenagers especially often imitate the behavmovie stars.'

Also in a report from PTC is the following: "Mounting evidence also points to the fact that highly sexualized images on television can shape teens' attitudes towards sex. Teenaged girls who watch a lot of sex on TV tend to have more sex partners. 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
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
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
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Bat flights await at Devil's Sinkhole

More than a million Mexican freetailed bats are taking flight from the depths of Devil's Sinkhole, a 310-foot collapsed limestone pit that is the heart of a 1,859-acre state natural area. It reigns as the largest single-chamber and third deepest cavern in

The mostly undeveloped Devil's Sinkhole State Natural area, located approximately 6 miles northeast of Rocksprings, is open to the public by prior arrangement only.

The nonprofit Devil's Sinkhole Society takes reservation for bat flight observations and afternoon sinkhole tours. The bats are at their peak during the months of August and September and into October.

Currently, bat tours take place Wednesday through Sunday nights and sinkhole tours on weekends only. Tour participants meet at the Visitors Center in Rocksprings for the 20-minute bus ride to Devil's Sinkhole, 6 miles northeast of town.

Tours will run through Oct. 19. Bat flight tour fees are \$10 for adults, \$8 for persons over 65, and \$6 for children 4 to 11. Daytime tour fees are \$6 per person.

Devil's Sinkhole State Natural Area is one of more than 120 state parks that make up the Texas State Park System. For tour reservations, call (830) 683-2287.

garding the eligibility of persons to purchase property at Texas tax sales, as provided by House Bill 335, passed by the 78th regular session of the Texas Legislature. Beginning with Texas tax sales conducted on or after October 1, 2003, purchasers at tax sales must present to the sheriff conducting the sale a written statement issued to the purchaser by the county chief appraiser who assesses and colects taxes for the county stating that the purchaser owes no delinquent property taxes to the

county and that there are no known or reported delinquent taxes owed by the purchaser to any school district or city with territory in the county. House Bill 335 further prohibits the sheriff or constable from delivering a tax deed to any purchaser who fails to present to the office the required written statement is sued by the county tax assessor-collector. In order to secure the required written statement from the County chief appraiser regarding your delinquent tax liability, contact the County Appraisal District office in person after September 1, 2003 for the correct form. You must complete the form, have it notarized, and present it to the County Chief Appraiser along with a paymen of the statutory fee of \$10.00. You are urged to submit the request form to the county chief appraiser well in advance of the tax sale at which you intend to bid. The statement issued by the tax assessor-collector will expire ninety (90) days after it is issued. A person who knowingly violates this law commits a

criminal offense.

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
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
