Gladys had been doing work toward her degree for some 10 years, which shows that she has more stick to it-iveness than many of



RAINS CAME Farmers in the Bovina area have been all smiles the past week, after getting from an inch to two inches of rain. Most of

the rain has been slow-falling in nature, so that it all soaked in. The above guage is a good indication of the rains of the past week.

Raintall Aids Area Cropland

The Bovina area received welcome moisture during the past week, with rainfall coming on two or three different nights.

Wednesday and Thursday nights, June 2-3 the area received from an inch to 1.5 inches, with more received in some places than others. Another rain fell west of town Monday night. Some places had received around two inches in all.

The Pleasant Hill area reportedly had received around 1.3 inches for the period.

Some hail damage has been sustained north and west of Bovina, with barley and wheat crops badly damaged in places. One source said that the small grain crops in the Rhea area have been hit and will suffer a 40 to 60 per cent loss.

However, little damage was noted right around Bovina and to the south, and farmers welcomed the moisture, the first major beneficial rainfall for 1976.

New Methodist **Pastors Named**

New pastoral appointments and changes in assignments in three West Texas districts of the United Methodist Church were announced recently by Bishop Alsie Carlton at the Northwest Texas-New Mexico Conferences joint meeting at Glorieta, N.M.

Rev. Howard Marcom, who has been pastor of First United Methodist Church here for the past four years, has been assigned to Hamlin. Rev. Oran Smith, pastor of the Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church for five years, is going to Welch-Wellman, replacing Rev. Gene Louder.

Rev. James Putnam, pastor at Lorenzo the past year, is the new pastor at Bovina.

Rev. and Mrs. Putnam are the parents of 10 children, eight boys and two girls. One son is a Methodist

minister, one is attending seminary, three are members of a gospel singing group in Dallas, two are in high school and one son is in junior high. The two girls are in elementary school

The Putnam family arrived in Bovina last week. Rev. Putnam occupied the pulpit Sunday.

Rev. Harvey Whittenburg of Hartley will replace Rev. Smith at Oklahoma Lane.

Rev. and Mrs. Marcom were in Hamlin last week. During their four years in Bovina, Mrs. Marcom has taught in Bovina Elementary School. They are the parents of four children--a married son and three daughters, Judy, Mary and Linda. Mary, a 1974 graduate of Bovina High School, attends South Plains College in Levelland. Linda will be a junior in high school next year.

Tarter Wins Bid Over Christian

Less than 25 per cent of the county's qualified voters took part in the Democratic party's second primary last Saturday, June 5, when two men received nomination to the county commissioner's court.

In precinct three, former county judge Archie Tarter won nomination to a spot as a commissioner on the court, and the same as was elected, since there are no Republican candidates for the position.

Tarter defeated longtime Oklahoma Lane party leader Wendol Christian, 246 votes to 175 for a seat on the commission. Christian won his home box with 79.5 per cent of the votes, 93.24, but the Farwell box was carried heavily by Tarter (74.8 per cent), 214 votes to 72. In addition, Tarter led in absentee ballots, 10-8.

A much closer race was staged in Precinct 1, where Ernest Anthony edged Raymond Euler, 238-208 for the Democratic nomination. Anthony still must face Republican Forrest Osborn in the November general election.

In the precinct 1 race, Anthony won Friona's box, 217-179; Euler won at Black, 18-9, and at Lakeview, the two candidates each received 11

In the two statewide races, county voters went along with the trend in the race for a spot on the Railroad Commission, giving winner Jon Newton even more of a majority than he received statewide.

Local and county voters, apparently remembering the performance of Sadler in his last essay in public office, gave him only 25.2 per cent of their votes, and 74.8 per cent for Newton.

In Bovina, Newton's majority was even more prounounced, as he picked up 39 votes to only eight for Sadler, a whopping 83 per cent for the winner.

Newton won every ballot box in the county except the Rhea box, where Sadler managed to tie him with six votes. The absentees were also tied at seven each. Newton's biggest margin was at Lakeview, 20-2, 90.1 per cent.

County voters differed from those across the state in their choice for the court of criminal appeals. Going mainly on the recommendation of the Texas Criminal Lawyers' Association and endorsements of several newspapers, Parmer voters gave Carl Dally a margin, however slight, 397-337.

Dally won every box except Oklahoma Lane, where the winner,

W.T Phillips, held a 42-34 lead. The voting was particularly light in the two precincts which were not electing commissioners this year. Just 48 voters turned out in Bovina, which had 326 voters in the first primary.

Only 12 voters voted at Rhea, and 15 at Lazbuddie. All told, just 75 of the 944 county voters casting ballots last Saturday resided in the two precincts without local races. The 944 votes compared to 2243 who voted in the first Democratic primary. A total of 323 had voted in the Republican primary, and were eligible to vote Saturday.

However, Saturday's turnout was 90 more than voted in the last Democratic runoff in 1968. There were no county races in that particular runoff, but there was a hotlycontested race for governor between Preston Smith and Don Yarborough.

In the Precinct 3 commissioner's race, Christian gained 27 votes from the margin Tarter had posted on May 1. In the first primary, Tarter led by 98 votes, 271-173, with two other candidates receiving 212 votes. The former judge's margin this time was 71 votes.



Nosema Locustae is not an Italian film star. It is the proper and scientific term for a parasite which causes a fatal disease . . . one that's good news. Good because the only victim is one of agriculture's top enemies, the Grasshopper. Underway right now, the testing of the effectiveness of the parasite is the largest of its kind in history. Nearly 100 thousand acres of ops are involved and results will be reported over a three year period. Basically, the idea of the program is to have grasshoppers eat wheat bran which has been treated with Nosema Locustae and sprayed over infested crops. Once ingested by the 'hopper the parasites multiply and eventually kill the grasshopper. Scientists are enthusiastic because it could mean effective control without the use of expensive pathogens. Initial testing indicated as many as 90 percent of the grasshoppers coming in contact with the parasite were eliminated.

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

Weyland plans to work up two shows during the two-week period, "You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown," and "A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum."



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
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Chuck's, Big Nick-Horn Lead Little League

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

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
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
