





## Give the gift of life

This time of year is a busy one for all of us. As you dash toward the holiday season, I urge you to take time out of your day and donate blood. The need is great, and the few minutes it takes may mean years of life for a sick or injured patient.

The good news is that millions of Americans voluntarily donate blood every year. The bad news is that this is not

Did you know that 60 percent of the U.S. population is eligible to give blood, but only 5 percent donates each year?

The demand for blood is constantly increasing, and the nation's blood banks are having difficulty keeping up. According to the American Red Cross, the amount of blood needed by hospitals increased more than 15 percent in the past year. Maintaining an adequate amount of blood for surgeries, trauma victims and treatment of diseases is becoming a year-round problem.

What's worse is that donations traditionally slump this time of year. An outbreak of the flu and bad weather can also affect donations. That means that the demand for blood is higher this time of year than in other

Other activities to be held throughout the weekend include a vendor area, featuring traditional Native American items school. 




