

citizens requesting a rollback election was not valid according to the standards set forth in Article 277.002 of the Texas Election Code.

In their letters, the county officials warned of the consequences of a rollback election.

They pointed out that the general fund is used to operate 90 percent of the county's budget and that it was not subject to a rollback. This is true, but what they didn't tell you is that it isn't eligible for a rollback because it is already at the maximum amount allowable by law.

In the letter from Melancon, he points out that the county generates "revenue from housing federal prisoners in our jail," but the commissioners cut the Sheriff's Office budget by 18 perof two jobs, thereby weakening security at the local jail.

Did you know that seven of the county's elected officials received longevity compensation? Did you realize that the commissioners not only receive a substantial salary, but they also get retirement and health insurance benefits? We're curious if these commissioners ran for office to better our community or to better their financial status.

Speaking of salaries, the county attorney's total compensation this year is \$48,117.23 that's a 94 percent increase from a salary of \$23,372.49 five years ago. The county judge's total compensation is \$47,887.12 an 83 percent increase from a cent. That led to the elimination salary of \$26,185.76 five short years ago.

Has your salary almost doubled in the last five years? The citizens of Kinney County spoke through a petition last week. They will speak again.



# How does food color affect your taste buds?

There are some things in life that are a set color item. Think about it - ketchup is red, carrots are orange, potatoes are white or orange, and chili is red.

Any of the above items in another color make me cautious. I remember the time my mother accidently put green food coloring into a 2-gallon pot of chili. I never fully believed, even after finally eating the last bite, that was really chili.

Saying all this, try this chili recipe, which by the way, is very good. And help me decide, is this really chili?

#### White Chili (for microwave)

2 large onions

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 3 cloves minced garlic

1 4-ounce can green chilies, chopped

2 19-ounce cans cannellini (white kidney) beans, drained 1 13<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-ounce can chicken broth

4 cups cut-up cooked chicken (preferably breast)

2 teaspoons ground cumin 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> teaspoon oregano

1/2 teaspoon salt <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> teaspoon cayenne pepper
