TB bacteria become active if the immune system can't stop them from growing. The active bacteria begin to multiply in the body and cause TB disease. Some people develop TB disease soon after becoming infected. before their immune system can fight the TB bacteria.

People with TB disease can be treated and cured if they seek medical help, although treatment may be long. Even better, today people who have TB infection but are not yet sick can take medicine so that they will never develop TB disease.

Each year in the United States, there are about 20,000 cases of active TB, a number that has been declining about 7 per-

Kinney County has two elections soon approaching. Citizens will consider rolling back the county's road and bridge tax, and then vote in party primaries for six county positions.

The rollback election is set for Feb. 7. Early voting will be from Jan. 19 through Feb. 2.

Filing for the six county positions is underway for the up-

coming March primaries. The six local positions on the ballot include county attorney, commissioners for Precinct 1 and Precinct 3, constable, sheriff and tax assessor-collector.

Candidates seeking election to those petitions can file through Jan. 2.

Candidates must file for election through the respective party chairmen.

Brackettville City Council member Mary Flores is county chair for the Democratic Party and Don Hood is the Republican chairman.

Early voting for the primary elections will be Feb. 17-27, and election day is on March 2.





I wish you and yours the merriest of Christmases. I hope you enjoy all of the love that your heart can hold. I trust the new year will be all that you hope and dream it to be.



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
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Capitol Comment

Looking back, moving forward

On March 4, 1789, the first session of Congress convened. More than two centuries later, Jan. 7, 2003, marked the beginning of the 108th U.S. Congress. As always, this one brought new and unexpected challenges, but overall we were able to accomplish some good things for the American people. This column is a look back over the year and looks forward to what the second half of the 108th Congress in 2004 will achieve.

Economic Security In May, President Bush

signed into law the 2003 Jobs and Growth package to return \$350 billion in tax cuts to the American people, building on the 2001 tax relief.

The legislation accelerated many of the reductions that were being phased in over several years including my marriage penalty relief bill, an increase in the child tax credit and lower marginal rates. It also provided important relief for businesses and \$20 billion to states where many are facing difficult budgetary shortfalls. I fought to adjust the allocation formula so that Texas ultimately received \$1.3 billion to help balance the state budget, a full \$100 million more than they were on track to get.

The good news is that our policies to boost the economy are working. In October, employment rose by 126,000 for a total of 286,000 new jobs over a three-month period. Additionally, the real gross domestic product, or output of goods and services produced in the U.S., increased at an annual rate of 8.2 percent in the third quarter of 2003, building on a 3.3 percent increase in the second quarter. We experienced the fastest growth in nearly two decades.

Domestic Security

We kicked off the year by confirming our nation's first secretary of Homeland Security, Tom Ridge, passing national AMBER Alert legislation to more quickly recover kidnapped children and enacting a budget to provide a spending blueprint for Congress.

We approved a record \$2.4 billion in funding to combat the global HIV/AIDS epidemic devastating Africa and the Caribbean, and passed the "do-notcall" registry bill to protect consumers from unwanted phone solicitations (which is now held up in Federal Court).

In the final days of the session we were finally able to fulfill a promise made to America's seniors by bringing Medicare up-to-date and offering a prescription drug benefit for the first time.

National Security

Perhaps the issue that most dominated 2003 was Operation Iraqi Freedom. In March we descended on Baghdad to remove the threat of Saddam Hussein. A democratic Iraq will stand as an example to all the Middle East and help ensure a safer world for future generations.

We have stood firm in support of our troops, providing the necessary funds to fight the war and help the Iraqi people more quickly gain control of their own destiny. We also passed the Armed Forces Tax Fairness Act and the Fallen Patriots Tax Relief Act to help military families.

Moving Forward

As with every year there are some important issues that were not resolved. We were unable to pass a comprehensive energy bill, something I have advocated during my decade of service in the Senate. Though we didn't get a bill this year, it is a top priority heading into 2004.

We'll also act to reauthorize highway legislation to create better highways and transportation systems, and hope to make progress on legislation I introduced to make Amtrak a viable, national alternative.

In 2004 we'll continue to fight for the fair treatment of judicial nominees and encourage up-or-down votes in the Senate to fill critical vacancies in our nation's courts.

As we move forward, we'll undoubtedly face new challenges and we'll tackle them for the good of the American people.



Tomato soup is fast, easy to make, and tastes better than store bought

I want to share a couple of quickies. As many know, Î make soup from scratch. If and when that's what is wanted, for the simple reason it not only has more "goodies" in it, it tastes better!

I must confess, I do buy tomato soup. All this is leading up to my hungries for tomato soup. It is the only thing for sure my chopped tummy will accept when I'm not feeling well.

Wouldn't you know - no to- broth mato soup! I got inventive and came up with an acceptable substitute I liked better than store bought. Why not use my idea and create your own?

Super Fast Tomato Soup 1 can diced tomatoes tomato sauce (not paste)

dash of worcestershire 1 tablespoon cream soup mix salt and pepper to taste

pat of butter (optional). Empty diced tomatoes into a sauce pan and add the desired amount of tomato sauce to make rich broth (varies on the amount being made). Then add the remaining ingredients and heat.

Add couscous and stir for 30 seconds. Add broth. Bring to a boil, stirring once. Cover tightly, remove from heat and let sit five minutes. In small bowl whisk lime juice, remaining 2 tablespoons of oil, cumin and hot pepper sauce.

Fluff couscous with fork, add dressing, and toss to combine. Add nuts and scallion, and toss to combine (or use lifting motion with large fork to mix).

Serve warm or at room temperature. It makes six servings.
