Voters rollback county tax rate

By J.J. GUIDRY Editor

The ballots are in and they have been counted — 80 percent of Kinney County citizens voting in the rollback election were in favor of the measure to reduce the county's road and bridge tax rate.

The rollback passed by a vote of 384-98, including 97-36 in Precinct 1, 89-18 in Precinct 2, 79-10 in Precinct 3 and 119-34 in Precinct 4.

There were 220 early votes cast and 262 on election day.


