Davis claims primary win King reclaims state seat

It looks like Kinney County will have a new commissioner next year.

Marvin Davis claimed a majority of the votes in Tuesday's primary to win the Democratic Party's nomination for commissioner of Precinct 1.

With no Republicans filed to run for the post, Davis is expected to take over the post on Jan. 1.

Davis topped the four-candidate field with 122 votes, while incumbent commissioner Francie Wylie tallied 77. Mike Holley, chairman of the Appraisal District board, garnered 23 votes and Linda Jaso had 16. "I was certainly surprised

Brackett students finish first TAKS exam

Students at Brackett ISD recently took the first of four Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) exams.


Emotions may be running highest this year among 11thgrade students, who are facing more tests with fewer chances to pass. They must pass the test, either now or in their senior year, to graduate from high school.

The state exam has four subject areas: English language arts, math, science and social studies. The English language arts was given two weeks ago, and the rest are scheduled for three consecutive days in April.

To pass the exams, juniors must remember what they learned in 9th and 10th grades, and, in some cases, 8th grade.

"Being prepared for a comprehensive exam can be difficult for students," BHS Principal Paula Renken said. "To be successful, students must have a working knowledge of the material.

Share your feelings and show you care

Yo Shanae: I have a problem. I don't know why, but this girl keeps making up things that are directed towards me.

I don't understand why she would be doing this, but it has really confused me. Should I say anything to her?

- Misty Eyes Well, Misty Eyes, thank you for being the very first of hopefully many questioners.

To answer your question, yes, you should eventually ask her what the deal is, but first, you should ask yourself some

Questions like, "Are the things she is saying about me intentionally hurtful?"

If so, ask yourself why. Could it be that she is bored, she has low self-esteem and feels she has to lower others to heighten her own position, or can it be that the age-old telephone has totally changed what her original message was?

It is always good to put yourself in the other person's shoes. After thinking about it, go and talk to her politely, making sure not to throw any negative assumptions at her.

Start the conversation out by saying something positive like, Why so-and-so, you are looking nice today," making sure that she knows you are not trying to attack her verbally.

Then, after starting a generic conversation, proceed to ask her about these rumors and explain how it makes you feel. Make sure not to make yourself too aggressive, and give her the benefit of the doubt.

Two things will happen - either she will deny having started any rumors, or she will admit her faults and explain herself.

Whatever she does, remember to stay calm and in control. You don't want to change the situation into a big blowout.

So if she does deny spreading rumors, then leave it at that, because she will know that you are hearing them, and do not appreciate it. Remember that words can never hurt you if you don't let them.

If she does admit her actions, then make sure to find out why, and explain to her that previously before hearing of these hurtful words, you had nothing against her and do not wish to start any problems.

Most likely, this person is just really insecure about themselves, and all they really need is a friend.

So if you tell her your feelings and show that you do care, you can turn a really negative situation into a positive one.

The Forum is being conducted in every county as a statewide effort of Texas Cooperative Extension, an agency of The Texas A&M University System, to bring together a diverse group of individuals, groups and organizations to identify issues and con-

"We want to get broad-based input into this process so that a plan can be developed for the future of each county and for Texas as a whole," said Dr. Chester Fehlis of College Station, extension director. "We also want other local, state and federal agencies and organizations to participate. Many of the needs and concerns of people can best be addressed through cooperation and partnerships among the agencies and organizations that serve them."

The Futures Forum process will help the extension develop its long-range plan for the next four years, 2005 through 2008, Fehlis said. However, emphasized that the true goal is to facilitate the identification of common needs and define a process for addressing these needs to create a better economic, environmental and social situation in communities across the state.

"We view this as a partnership effort, all of us working together for the future of Texas," Fehlis said.

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Courthouse named a historic landmark

The Texas Historical Commission has recognized the Kinney County Courthouse as a significant structure in Texas history by naming it a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark. The designation is the highest honorthe state bestows to a historic structure for architectural integrity and historical associations.

A dedication ceremony will be held to commemorate the event on March 22. On this day the Courthouse will be 93 years old. Speakers for the afternoon will include state, county, city and local organization officials, to share and witness this exciting historical event.

"Historic structures serve as directories of early residents and reflect the cultural influences that helped shape our state's communities," said Larry Oaks, executive director of the Texas Historic Commission.

"The Recorded Texas Historic Landmark helps bring attention to these community treasures and the importance of their preservation. Awareness and education are among the best ways to guarantee the preservation of such architectural and heritage-rich sites. This designation is a tool that will increase public awareness of these important cultural resources," Oaks

A Brief History: The Kinney County Courthouse March 22, 1911 - March 22, 2004

The rough and lawless area Masonic Lodge No. 444. called Kinney County has been sparsely inhabited for thousands of years.

Thwarted by desolation, constant Indian attacks and Mexican raids, early attempts to establish missions and settlements were doomed.

Kinney County was carved out of Bexar County by state legislation in 1850, and named for the early settler and adventurer Henry Lawrence Kinney (1814-1862).

year Fort Clark was established, the town of Brackett was formed - 77 years had passed since the first attempt to establish a mission. The settlement was named in honor of Oscar B. Brackett.

Although the formation of the county was authorized in 1850, the first county meeting was not held until Jan. 27, 1873. This meeting was held in the "schoolhouse," which was "kept in old Brackett house. The first 1879 Courthouse

was in use until 1911. It later served as the Federal Post Office for a time and, in 1914, was sold to the Las Moras dome/clock tower.

The two-story 1911 Courthouse constructed during the "Golden Era of Courthouse Construction" is located on Texas Highway 674 in Brackettville on the same block and directly behind the 1879 Courthouse.

This section of the state highway was first named Post Street and later re-named Ann Street in honor of Ann O'Hanlon Ross, an early settler of the area.

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
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


