After being told that the city was footing bills averaging over \$100 a month for an employee's cell phone and residential phone, council members last Monday voted to cancel service on both phones.

The council made the decision following a recommendation by City Secretary Bonnie Rigby that Mayor Joe Garza initially was against.

Garza relented after being reminded by the council that earlier in the evening, council had

Existing Use permits are for applicants whose wells were completed and operational from Jan. 1, 1992 through Jan. 7, 2003. Regular permits are for applicants whose wells were operational from Jan. 8, 2003 to the present.


