City considers gas rate increase

The city council postponed approval of the 04-05 budget last Tuesday night, pending possible action to increase the flat rate for natural gas.

City Secretary Bonnie Rigby reported that the present flat rate of \$11.05 does not allow the city to profit from natural gas sales. According to Rigby at the current rate the city is losing \$59,000 a year.

She stated the flat rate would have to be raised to \$25.00 per customer in order for the city to break even. To generate any revenue from gas sales the rate would have to be raised even higher.

Alderman Tully Welch pointed out that the price of all petroleum products, including natural gas, has skyrocketed in recent years while the city's rates remained unchanged.

Alderman Lydia Tipps expressed concern that a sudden, large increase in the flat rate would create a hardship for the city's elderly citizens, many of whom lived on small fixed incomes. Rigby agreed this was problematic, but reiterated that the city could not continue to sell gas at a loss.

Mayor Joe Garza suggested that the adoption of the budget be postponed until Thursday's meeting, giving the council time to consider this issue.

Continuing her report, Rigby informed the council that most line items in the proposed budget remained relatively unchanged except the line item for the volunteer fire department. She relayed that Fort Clark Springs had declined to donate the \$5,000 they usually contribute each year.

When asked if there was a specific reason for the withdrawal, she said:

Water District hires board member's attorney

The Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District voted to hire Tim Brown, attorney at law, to serve as its special counsel concerning spring flow last Monday night.

"He represents twelve other water districts," said General Manager Darlene Shahan.

Director Chris Ring, prior to voting, asked if it was a problem that Brown was his personal attorney.

"He would let us know if he had a conflict of interest," said Shahan.

Director Ring through his family's corporation has an existing and historic use permit pending with the District on which Brown legally represents him. Part of Ring's permit request is spring flow.

Lynn Sherman of WaterTexas addressed the matter in public

comment.

Sherman pointed out the District just voted to hire an attorney to serve as a special counsel for spring flow, who legally represents a Board member, and legally represents that Board member on a permit pending with the District that requests spring flow.

"I think it is important for the public, who may not be aware of everything that is going on, (to know) that the board just hired an attorney that represents Mr. Ring and who helped prepare an application. That he (Tim Brown) appeared here just last week, for Mr. Ring, relative to spring flow on Pinto Creek."

"That very same attorney, now is going to be representing this district, on the very same issues. I just think it is important for you to know that. I

would say, as a member of the public, there is a lot more than just Mr. Ring recusing himself. I think it actually is a situation where you have a lawyer who is asking for a permit, for spring flow, from this board and now he will be before this board advising it on the issue of spring flow. I think that is objectionable, but that is for you to decide," said Sherman.

Also in public comment, Jennifer McDaniel asked how much Brown was going to bill the District for his work. No answer was given. Board President Cecil Smith later remarked the attorneys they looked at in the past were somewhere between \$100-200 an hour.

"I am very curious why you did not go to Mr. Sledge."

"It just looks very suspicious" ■ See District/Page 8






Room for expansion

Point of sale sticker printing introduced in Kinney County

Point of Sale Sticker Printing (POSSP) and a new vehicle registration sticker design are being introduced in Kinney County. The new registration stickers feature several improvements to deter sticker misuse and eliminate the need for state inventory control.

The new process was piloted in Caldwell and Bastrop Counties and will be implemented in 185 counties across the state beginning August 25.

This initial phase involves counties that do not process transactions through subcontractor stations (e.g grocery stores) or automobile dealerships.

These latter types of transactions will be piloted in McLennan, Williamson, Angelina and Harris Counties over the

next few months, with full statewide implementation expected to be completed by early 2005.

Registration stickers will now be printed at the point of sale. Information specific to the registered vehicle will be printed directly on the sticker, which will help deter theft.

TXDOT switched from license plate stickers to windshield stickers for most passenger vehicles about a decade ago to cut down on theft, and the new method will enhance these efforts.

(Plate stickers are still used for motorcycles, trailers and some other types of vehicles).

Each sticker will show the last eight digits of the vehicle identification number, the license plate number, county of registration, and registration

month and year.

Because each windshield and plate sticker is vehicle-specific, it is important for customers who own more than one vehicle to be sure they apply the sticker to the correct one.

Also, customers should carefully follow instructions for peeling and applying the sticker. The new windshield sticker must be peeled from the back of the form; otherwise, it could be damaged and a replacement sticker would be necessary. Plate sticker should be peeled from the front of the form.

When the POSSP method is completely implemented, the new type of sticker will be issued for all registration renewals, including in-person, mail-in and Internet transactions.

POSSP prints the sticker on

the customer's receipt, so stapling stickers and maintaining manual sticker books will no longer be necessary. This also eliminates the manufacturing and storage of 400,000 pre-printed sticker books annually for the current system.

In the past, yearly windshield stickers were printed in mass quantities based on projections of annual vehicle registrations.

POSSP will eliminate the waste of excess stickers resulting from this process each year. As each sticker is printed "on demand" for a specific vehicle rather than preprinted and later assigned to a vehicle, any internal accounting of the blank forms used for the POSSP is now optional rather than required.

Registration transactions will be tracked through the state's

automated Registration and Title System in much the same way as the previous method.

"This new method is a significant improvement in our processes," said Martha Pena Padron, Kinney County Tax Assessor-Collector.

"It offers greater protection for vehicle owners by making the stickers worthless if they're stolen. We also expect to improve our customer service efficiency. Because POSSP prints the sticker on the customer's receipt, my deputy Catherine and I will no longer have to staple registration sticker to receipts and maintain manual sticker books and inventories."




Two of their tribe saw me making my escape. They went

Texans should be taxed on our taxes no more

It was the year of the Challenger explosion, the Chernobyl disaster, and the return of Haley's Comet. President Ronald Reagan was in the White House and the Communist leadership was firmly entrenched in the Soviet Union. Movie screens were dominated by box office hits such as *Top Gun*, and *Crocodile Dundee* and series like *Dallas*, *The Cosby Show*, and *Cheers* filled television sets. Here in Texas, the Houston Rockets won the NBA's Western Division and the Lady Longhorns were the NCAA basketball national champions.

Seems like a long time ago, doesn't it? That was also the last time Texans could deduct their state and local sales taxes on federal income tax forms.

This common sense deduction was eliminated in 1986. Unfortunately, for the past 18 years, taxpayers in Texas and six other states have been held to a separate standard by the Internal Revenue Service. Fifty-five million taxpayers - one in five Americans - are shouldering a higher tax burden simply because their states choose to fund local government through means other than an income tax.

State and local governments have various alternatives for raising revenue. Some levy income taxes, some use sales and property taxes, and others use a combination. My contention is that the federal government should not select only one type of state revenue for special, favorable treatment. There is no logical reason to discriminate against states that have the wisdom to avoid a state income tax. As your Senator, I have fought against this disparity for years and sponsored legislation to correct it since I came to the U.S. Senate.

This year, we have our best chance to end that inequity in the tax code. Earlier this month, Congressman Kevin Brady (R-Woodlands) and I organized a rally of 30 Members of Congress, Democrats and Republicans from all over the country, to support our efforts to reinstate the deduction as part of broader tax legislation in final negotiations between the House and the Senate. It's not often that a Dallas Republican and a Seattle Democrat see eye to eye but, in this case, the reason for agreement was obvious: People should not pay taxes on their taxes.

Fixing this discrepancy could have a significant economic impact across the Lone Star State. The Texas Comptroller estimates that more than \$740 million would stay in the hands of state taxpayers. The average Texas family would save \$310 annually and the average family of four would save \$928.

Some wonder how this plan could be administered. No, you wouldn't have to keep track of your receipts all year. When the time comes to file, taxpayers could use tables compiled by the Secretary of the Treasury to determine the amount of the deduction, taking into account the taxpayer's state of residence, filing status, number of dependents, adjusted gross income, and state and local sales tax rates.

Texans, along with every other U.S. citizen, should not be taxed on their taxes. Correcting this inequity is a matter of simple fairness and could provide an enormous boost to the Texas economy. The status quo is not acceptable and I am committed to achieving this tax fairness now.

The cost is \$10.00 per person.

The class is a 12 hour course needed for certification. Everyone must attend all 12 hours to successfully complete the course and be certified.

Texas Game Wardens top 10 Check-list for hunters

AUSTIN, Texas — With the beginning of hunting season, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Game Wardens would like to remind hunters to have "Every year, our game wardens issue hunters citations that could have been avoided," said Col. Jim Stinebaugh, TPWD law enforcement director. We'd rather help folks learn to follow the rules and avoid common mistakes, which will keep them safe as well as legal. "For example, Stinebaugh says the most common hunting law violation in Texas is failure to be certified in hunter safety. From Sept. 1, 2003 to Aug. 23, 2004, game wardens cited 2,521 hunters with the violation of Hunter Safety regulation (no hunter education certification). This is a Class C Parks and Wildlife misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of as much as \$500. Following is a table of the last season's most common violations and their punishments, from most common to least common.



A Little on the Wildlife Side

Every hunter born on or after September 2, 1971, must successfully complete a Hunter Education Training Course.

Hunters of all ages are welcome to attend. A parent or other relative is encouraged to attend with their child. The minimum age of certification is 12 years old. In other words, you must be 12 years old at the start of the course.

If you are a hunter and you are 17 or older and born after September 2, 1971, you must

have this course to hunt. You will receive a citation if you hunt and have not completed the course.

This course is good for life. It has to be completed only one time. Other states may require that a hunter complete a Hunter Safety or Education Course before hunting there. This course meets the requirements necessary for hunting out of state.

Additional information regarding Hunter Education:

If you were born on or after September 2, 1971, and you are:

- age 17 and over, you must successfully complete a hunter education course to hunt

- age 12 through 16, you must successfully complete a hunter education course or be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older

when hunting - under 12 years of age, you must be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older when hunting. You are not old enough to take the course and be certified.

Hunters, regardless of age, need to purchase a hunting license and any stamps needed and must carry them with him or her at all times while hunting. Upon completion of the Hunter Education Course, you will receive proof that you have completed the course. This proof of certification is required to be on your person, along with your hunting license, while hunting. It is not required to purchase a license. This time it was Kody Yeager connecting with Kesteloot on a seven yard pass to put the Tigers up 21-0.

The second quarter saw the

Tigers on the move again. Charlie Slaughter did the honors, plunging in from one yard out. With Brackett up 27-0, the Eagles again failed to get a first down and chose to punt. After Leakey's first punt, the Eagles had chosen to kick away from Brackett's return men. On this play the punt went straight to Talamantes and he again made the Eagles pay. The punt return team once again picked up most of their blocks and Talamantes sped past the other defenders for a 65 yard return that ended in a Tiger touchdown. On the next offensive series, Cody Edwards took a sweep and went 17 yards for Brackett's sixth TD of the night.

After halftime Brackett's powerful offensive line again opened a huge hole and Clyde Adams went 47 yards to put the Tigers up 47-0. The defense again held and Edwards again found the end zone on a nine yard run. The fourth quarter again saw the Tiger defense smother every offensive play that Leakey ran. With the Tiger offense taking over again, the Tigers put together a time consuming drive that ended with Evaristo Villarreal scoring the final touchdown of the night on a three yard run.

The Tiger offense was led by

Yeager who completed three of four passes for 46 yards and one TD. Yeager also ran the ball six times for 32 yards. The running backs were led by Clyde Adams with 90 yards on seven carries and one touchdown, he also had one reception for 25 yards. Talamantes carried six times for 75 yards, Edwards had four carries for 50 yards and two touchdowns, while Slaughter had 33 yards on four carries and one touchdown. Kesteloot contributed 46 yards rushing on six attempts, two receptions for 21 yards, one rushing touchdown, and one receiving touchdown. Villarreal added 18 yards on three carries with one touchdown, Anthony Munoz had two carries for 12 yards, Robert Davis carried four times for 12 yards, and Tillman Davis carried one time for nine yards.

The two touchdowns that the punt return team scored kept the offense off the field long enough to prevent the Tiger running backs from having a 100 yard rusher for the first time all season. The Tiger scoring machine will bring their high powered offense back home this week. The Tigers face off against Rock-springs Friday night at Tiger Stadium. The kickoff will be at 7:30 PM.





How do you work with fruit?

Immediately we see that Jesus wants figs for breakfast, yet when He goes up to the tree there are no figs. Jesus tells the tree that it will never bear fruit again and the tree instantly withers from the roots up.

In this story we find that we are like the tree. We are called to "Fruit Bearers", yet statisti-

cally only 20 percent of the people in any church do 80 percent of the work and give 80 percent of the money!

So where does that leave everyone else? Fellow pastor Johnny Hunt identified five types of "fruit workers" that most people are.

First, there are your "Fruit Bearers". This is the 20 percent of people that carry the load. They do the work, give the money, serve faithfully. They are usually unnoticed and don't garner a great deal of praise. They quietly go about God's work and do what needs to be done. The funny thing about "Fruit Bearers" is, they don't want attention. It is always nice to have a "thank you" frequently, but that is all they want.

The second group of people

you find in churches are "Fruit Inspectors". These are the people who inspect what everyone else is doing and tell them how it could be done different or, usually, how it could be done better. The "Inspectors" generally have the loudest voices. But, the loud voice usually comes from the cheapest seats. Last year my wife surprised me with tickets to the Dallas Stars hockey game. I am, admittedly, a sports fanatic and I love hockey. The Stars had scheduled a game for Valentine's Day and my wife got us tickets to the game. We were in the upper deck of American Airlines Arena and throughout the game the "boos" always originated from the people around us. This is how an "Inspector" works, they don't want to be put out but they better have a voice in everything that is done.

Next come the "Fruit Flies". Every church has "Fruit Flies" in it. These are the people who won't show up in church unless something stinks. These people are very similar to the "Inspectors", but they only come to cor-

porate worship. Other than that, they only come around when there is a controversy or a big issue coming up for discussion.

Then there are the "Fruit Loops". I don't think anything else needs to be said here. Finally, there are the "Fruit Destroyers". These folks exist for one purpose, to destroy the work that God is doing. Notice I said God? That's because the work of the church is not mine, or yours, it is God's work. God exists to glorify His name. We exist to glorify God's name. The work of any church is to glorify God. However, we are falling way behind in our work.

In my title I posed a simple question, how do you work with fruit? Now, you must answer that question. Which one of the five categories do you fit into. If you are in any category besides "Fruit Bearer", you are doing the wrong things. God calls us to glorify His name and to do that is a lifestyle. Every thought, every word, and every action must be focused on giving glory to our creator. Have you glorified God lately?

The early church leaders tried to sort out many of the disagreements in the church through courts, trials, and statements of what was correct belief (orthodoxy) and incorrect belief (heresy). The statements became sources for many of the "creeds"

used in some Christian congregations today. Some Christian congregations avoid creedal statements as divisive, a stance I deeply respect.

In general, Christians broadly agree that the church consists of the faithful, baptized believers in Jesus. Sadly, we understand the details very differently. Some don't baptize. Some use only vocal music for worship. Some hold a tradition of succession from their local minister to the apostles. Some don't drink alcohol. The list of differences in practice could fill this column for centuries. Even

if our practice of faith didn't separate us, our traditions of worship would at least group us differently. Some emphasize preaching as the most important act in worship. Others understand prayer to be the pinnacle of the Sunday service (or other days, too!) Still others focus on the meal remembering Christ's death.

Even within our small community, we worship in several different traditions. Though we have different understandings of the fullness of God's truth, we are united in a supremely important way.

District reluctant to hear information regarding water availability in county

when you do something like this," added McDaniel.

Sherman was on the agenda to give a presentation to the district.

Although no limitation was posted limiting the scope of the presentation, Smith said, only spring flow would be discussed.

"I wanted to have a chance to talk to you about spring flow. First of all, I am going to start off with water availability because all of this is tied together," said Sherman.

"Lynn, Lynn, this has nothing to do, if you are going to

(talk about) spring flow, I do not want any of this ... and you know that we can not sit here and listen at that. Are you going to try and declare us ineligible for district hearing," replied Smith.

"I said, I'm not listening to that. Take that off! If you don't, you are not going to show your presentation," added Smith.

"Mr. Smith what we are here to do today ...," replied Sherman.

Smith interrupted, "You are here today to talk about spring flow and spring flow only and that is not."

"No, it actually is, because

spring flow is in relation to water availability," replied Sherman.

"I said, I wanted only spring flow, I do not need none of this other flow," answered Smith.

"The spring flow is related. I mean, all this is related to the spring flow," said Sherman.

"I am saying that we do not need this in here," said Smith.

Sherman told Smith he would explain how the two were related.

"You are here to set the spring flow allocation. Spring flow allocation is directly related to the amount of water that is available within the district and to the extent you are setting a number (for spring flow), it needs to be tied scientifically to something," said Sherman.

"I am going to give you about two minutes to prove that," replied Smith.

"The only reason for doing it now, as was indicated in the last meeting, now as opposed to later, was to help you manage the water that your going to be permitting through these permit hearings. It is all tied together, it is all related," said Sherman.

"You can not mention permit hearings," said Director Don Hood.

"Actually, that was mentioned by a board member during the last meeting. It did not come from me," replied Sherman.

Sherman continued with his

presentation only to once again be interrupted.

"Lynn, that is it, that's it, you must take this off that board, said Smith.

"If you do not take it off, I am going to have a deputy take you out of here," Smith added.

"Water production from Pinto Valley does not effect ...," said Sherman.

"Now you are making a statement that is not proven," said Smith.

"Either I am going to back it up or I am not Mr. Smith. I have people here from the fort that I want to be able to talk to about this," replied Sherman.

"If you want to give them this you can go outside and give it to them. We are not sitting here, listening at all this stuff that has not been proven," said Smith.

"All we want to hear from you is spring flow, volumes of spring flow, not geology ...," said Director Dub Miller.

"Why it is relevant is because you are getting ready to set caps today on the amount of pumping," replied Sherman.

At this point, Director Hood attempted to adjourn the meeting.

"I am going to unplug it, if you do not pay attention to our president. I am dead serious about this," Hood subsequently stated.

The presentation continued in part but was cut short by the board of directors.
