She married Thomas Vondy of Houston in 1929 at the little Catholic church on Sweeney Street in Brackettville.

Miss Vondy fondly recalls having the would-be Texas Governor Dolph Brisco as a student and doing business with then-construction mogul John Nance Garner. Garner would move on to be the



Vice-President of the United States.

Following time away from Brackettville, she returned and taught from 1959 until 1971.

After retiring from Brackettville Public School, Agnes taught Headstart and became interested in historical work.

Agnes now belongs to the Historical Society Daughters of the Confederacy and Descendants of the Republic of Texas and the Genealogy Society of Brackettville and Uvalde. She still takes care of her family of cats.



The bomber crashed in the mission over New Guinea on mountains and Carver's parents in Eagle Pass got the word their Saturday, when he was bur- son was missing in action. alive and would return to Eagle Pass, but both died not knowing exactly where their son had fallen.

Then, in 1998, natives found the wreckage of the ill-fated B-17. In the wreckage were the remains of Lt. Carver and the rest of the crew.

It would take time and science to identify him officially, but Lt. Carver's dog tags were found in the wreckage. Lt. Carver began his journey home.

He was buried near his mother in the Eagle Pass cemetery. To honor the fallen aviator, two T-6As from Laughlin Air Force Base flew over the funeral service at 11 a.m., Jan. 29.

"It is our privilege to pay tribute to a fallen comrade," said Col. Tod D. Wolters, the commander of the 47th Flying Training Wing here. "It's a time-honored tradition, a way we aviators honor our own. Whether he died in combat yesterday or more than 60 years ago does not lessen the respect due a fallen warrior. We're proud to do this for him and his loved ones."


