Propaganda masquerading as fact

I've always been appalled by the Brackettville tradition of bulk-mailing false, misleading or sometimes slanderous letters. Usually we receive these unsigned letters the day of a local election. The intent is to sling some last minute mud in an attempt to influence voters.

Last week I received a news-fers. letter from the Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District that would undoubtedly make the unknown writers of the letters mentioned above very proud. While all of the information is provided by the district under the label "General Manager's Report", Darlene to 8.62 acre feet per acre of un-Shahan's name is conspicuously absent from the document. Even where the district contact information is listed you will not find the name of the general manager.

Most of the newsletter is about Senate Bill 1857. Several excerpts from SB 1857 are included; followed by the general manager's personal opinion about the excerpts and their alleged effects on groundwater regulation in Kinney County.

One such opinion states, "The 'aquifer' is defined in the EAA legislation and does not include those areas outside of its boundaries. The language would appear to allow unlimited pumping in all areas in Kinney County outside of the small area in eastern Kinney County designated as the Edwards Aguifer, which includes, under these guidelines, all of the permittees located in 'Pinto Valley' and the Austin Chalk areas below Highway 90."

This statement is false. All groundwater withdrawal in Kinney County would be regulated under SB 1857.

SB 1857 that is missing from the General Manager's Report. Section 5 (b) of SB 1857 states "The authority's powers regarding termine the increase or mother, myself and The Brackunderground water apply only to underground water within or withdrawn from the aquifer or any other underground water resource made subject to the authority's jurisdiction. Once again, the "Report" misses the mark by relying on false facts. The annual average discharge of Las Moras, Pinto and Mud Creek springs is slightly less than 20,000 acre feet. And while Brackettville may be pumping 600 acre feet per year, if you read last week's paper you know that Brackettville citizens are only using about 35% of that number or 210 acre feet.

The general manager's estimate for water demand by exempt wells is far from realistic. An exempt well is a well capable of producing no more than 25,000 gallons of water per day. In order for 933 exempt wells to produce 13,000 acre feet per year, they would all have to be capable of producing at least 25,000 gallons per day and run continuously for 6 months.

Taking those things into consideration I would say 1,000 or 2,000 acre feet would be a far more accurate estimate of what these wells could produce annu-
