



Chinese Chicken Breast 6 lb. chicken breast, boned

and skinned, 5 tbsp. butter, 1 cup thinly sliced water chestnuts, 1 cup chopped bamboo shoots, 2 cups sliced celery, 2 cups pea pods, 3 cups chicken broth, 1/4 cup soy sauce, 2 1/2 tsp. salt, 2 tsp. MSG, 1 tsp. each sugar and pepper, 2 tsp. cornstarch and 1 cup walnut halves.

Slice chicken in julienne strips and saute in 4 tbsp. butter until firm to the touch. Stir in the next 5 ingredients.

Blend cornstarch with small utes. amount of water; add to chicken and cook until clear and thick, stirring constantly.



Strayhorn delivered \$344.5 million in July sales tax allocations to cities, counties and other local taxing entities, up 9.2 percent compared to last July. So far this calendar year, sales tax allocations to local governments are running 7.1 percent higher than last year.



July. Calendar year-to-date, county sales tax allocations are 9.7 percent higher than last year.




