

State Auditor issues KCGCD Report

District board's lack of oversight contributes to weakness

(KCGCD).

The report found significant deficiencies in the district's financial operations. Those deficiencies have prevented the district from ensuring it has timely, complete, and accurate financial information for decision making; is able to meet its financial obligations; or protects against violations, abuse, and fraud.

In addition, the report finds the district's board has not demonstrated the financial oversight (b) required by state law. The report states the lack of proper financial oversight has contributed to the weaknesses in accounting procedures and con-







The report indicated the district has spent \$389,909 in legal fees from its creation in Sept. 2001 through August 31, 2005.

"Attorneys were paid to develop the district's bylaws, management plan, and rules, as well as to develop permit hearing procedures, attend all permit hearings, and, more recently, represent the district in litigation. In a survey of 23 other groundwater conservation districts in Texas, state auditors determined

had inadequate physical security that other districts were not routinely using attorneys in their permit-hearing processes. Although the other districts reported that they use a judicial process for permits, these districts' board presidents act as hearing officers, and these districts reported they use attorney services only when needed," the audit says.

> The audit reports General Manager Darlene Shahan attempted to withhold information from state auditors. Throughout the audit, state auditors repeatedly asked Shahan if the district had a receipt book. After interviewing former General Manager Don Ralston auditors discovered he had used a numbered receipt book to record fees and deposits. Auditors again asked Shahan for the receipt book and explained Ralston had said a re-

Auditors noted the district could not provide any evidence it had submitted an article for publication and that there were at least three other newspapers that circulated in Kinney

The Brackett News has received one newsletter, not a press release, from the district during Shahan's tenure as general manager. The newsletter did not contain any information regarding water conservation. It did however contain numerous misstatements of fact in addition to erroneous and potential libelous statements concerning permit applicants. KCGCD press releases The Brackett News has managed to obtained have been through third parties. In fact, The Brackett News is regularly told by Shahan it must file an open records request for any information it seeks from the dis-

"Management's responses state that 'with few exceptions, the district agrees with the recommendations."

However, in several instances, the district states that it believes its current practices already address the issues auditors identified.

This audit's scope, methodology, and criteria were objective and thorough and provided sufficient evidence to support the issues in this report.

None of the information the district provided in its responses, or at any time during this audit, changes the issues and recommendations in this report," the audit stated.

Tigerettes lose to Harper 47-27


The Varsity Tigerettes lost to Harper 47-27 on Jan. 31.
