Local Family Enjoys Tour Of England

To see the pageantry of the changing of the guard at Buckingham Palace or stroll through the lush Kennsington Gardens is what dreams are made of. But for Thomas and Virginia Rhodes it was their summer

The Rhodes family of Bovina and their daughter, Rhonda Rhodes and granddaughter, Ragan Armstrong, 12, recently returned from their seven-day trip to London, England.

They flew out of Denver, Colorado, where their daughter lives, on June 2. They had a stop in Washington D.C. at Dulles International Airport and finally landed at Heathrow Airport in London.

They stayed in the Hospitality Inn, across the street from the Kennsington Gardens, which is 307 acres of gardens, paths and water fountains. The inn is adjacent to the famous Hyde Park, as well.

The group went on two guided tours and spent the rest of the time seeing the sights on their own. They visited Westminster Abbey, St. Paul's Cathedral where Prince Charles and Lady Diana were married, the Mansion House, the Lord Mayor's residence, London Bridge and the Tower Bridge.

Other places they visited were the Houses of Parliament, Big Ben clock tower and followed Downing

While at the Buckingham Palace, they witnessed the changing of the guard. Virginia explained that it was full of color and she said she learned that the "queen occupies 12 private rooms in the palace."

She compared Westminster Abbey and the St. Paul's Cathedral. "I can understand why Princess Diana chose to get married in St. Paul's Cathedral," she said, "I though St. Paul's was better than Westminster Abbey."

Although, there's many sights to behold in London, it isn't quite like how most people tour in the United States. London has a series of underground subway systems called "The Tubes". Virginia said the tubes were a little confusing. "There may be as many as 10 exits to get back to the surface," she said.

After touring London, the Rhodes group traveled to Bath, which is pronounced baath and rhymes with moth. countryside town is comparable to Lubbock in size, Virginia said. They stopped at Stonehenge before traveling into Bath. The town was built in AD44 by the Romans and is coined the

She said they ate lunch at Sally Lunn's Tea Shop which is in a large building that begins 18 feet higher than the park in front of it. She explains that it was built on the rubble of other buildings.

On Sunday morning, June 6, they attended the Wembley Church of Christ in Bath, along with Gary and Kay Snead of Snead Realty in Friona. "We arranged it before we left for London," she said.

They rode the catamaran across the River Thames to East London. They visited Greenwich observatory, where the time is set for the rest of the world. Also, Ragan, their granddaughter, stood on both the Western and Eastern hemispheres, where the longitude divides the hemispheres.

During their trip the Rhodeses attended two theatres, the Victoria Palace where they saw "Buddy" after the Buddy Holly story and the Palace Theatre where they watched the musical, "Les Miserable".

"They mentioned Clovis and Lubbock in the play, "Buddy," she said, "It was certainly a tie to this

Another treat was their opportunity to have their photo taken with Arnold Schwarzenegger, well, his wax facsimile, at Madame Tussauds on Baker St. The wax figures represented many different people and times; from Shakespear to Twiggy.

They enjoyed some local favorites such as fish and chips, shepherd's pie and a wide range of cuisine. "Every time we would go eat, Thomas would go find a Burger King," she said.

She said of the trip, "Impressed! I would like to go again." She added that she was surprised at the cleanliness in spite of the many visitors. They saw a lot of bizarre dress and hair styles, too.

Virginia said that they chose to go to London, because the people speak the same language since it was Thomas' first trip abroad. She and Rhonda traveled to Spain in

State Revenues May Be Lost By Schools

If early predictions come to pass, both Friona and Bovina Independent School Districts stand to lose state revenue money for the upcoming school year, according to figures supplied by the Equity Center in Austin.

Senate Bill 7, passed June 1, is designed to equalize the funding between the wealthier school districts and the poorer districts. Yet, the Equity Center, which advocates for the less fortunate school districts, believes that many schools stand to lose.

Hal Ratcliff, superintendent of the Friona ISD, said, "Preliminary figures show us losing \$220,000."

Tommy Cathy, superintendent of the Bovina ISD, said he wasn't exactly sure of the implications of the bill, but added, "We cannot afford to lose a dime."

Both superintendents are concerned of what the loss of revenue may do to education. a larger budget for the state's school Equity Center predicts that Friona system, but it may fall short. will have to make up 11 cents per Tommy Cathey said small increases \$100 to equal the revenue they in student population may further

year. Bovina will have to make up a deficit of 22 cents per \$100.

The current tax rate for Friona is \$1.01, which will have to increase to \$1.12 to offset the cuts. Bovina will need to go from the current rate of \$.97 to \$1.19 to cover the deficit.

This area isn't the only one which will be struck by the bill. Over 500 districts stand to lose revenue. In nearby Amarillo, the schools may lose 11 cents per \$100, Farwell will sit at 17 cents per \$100 loss, Hereford has a deficit of 21 cents per \$100 and Dimmit at 13 cents per \$100 loss.

Early predictions show that wealthier districts may be in a position to lower the tax rates. Arlington, Austin, Spring Branch and Clear Creek school districts have to lower their income to the schools and one way to do so is

The state legislatures approved received in the 1992-1993 school stretch the already strained budget.



Several Varieties Of Squash Available During Summer

Squash was one of those foods that, as a child, I never knew whether I should like or not. It was a food that most grown-ups liked, automatically making it one that kids didn't like.

However, my mother cooked home-grown crook-neck yellow squash in the summer, sprinkled it with salt and pepper and topped it with pats of butter. Now, put butter on something and I just can't seem to say "no."

It took a little more coaxing to convince me that zucchini was good. But now I enjoy all kinds of squash cooked in a variety of ways.

The term summer squash typically refers to soft-skinned squash that traditionally were available only in the summer. However, today most squash varieties include vellow straightneck and crook-neck, zucchini and pattypan.

When buying summer squash, look for small, heavy squash with tender skin that yields easily when you apply pressure with your thumb. At home, refrigerate the

squash and use within a few days.

Summer squash do not need to be peeled; the skin is tender enough to eat with the rest of the vegetable. Summer squash often is cut into slices or strips and served raw with other vegetables and a dipping

Squash can be boiled, baked, fried, grilled, steamed and used in soups and stews. To grill, slice the squash in half lengthwise, brush with butter and sprinkle with salt, pepper and herbs (thyme, rosemary, dill, etc.) and grill until it can be pierced easily with a fork.

Try the following recipes with this summer's crop of squash: SUMMER SQUASH MEDLEY

2 tablespoons butter or margarine 1 medium onion, thinly sliced 1 large zucchini, thinly sliced 4 medium-size yellow squash,

thinly sliced 1 medium-size green pepper, cut into thin strips

3 medium-size tomatoes, peeled and quartered

Salt and pepper to taste 1 cup freshly grated Parmesan

1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley Melt butter in a large skillet, coating sides and bottom of pan. Allow butter to heat on mediumhigh for 2 minutes. Add onion and stir-fry briefly. Stir in zucchini and yellow squash and green pepper; cook for 2 to 3 minutes or until tender-crisp. Add tomatoes, salt and pepper, to taste. Stir well. Sprinkle cheese and parsley over the vegetables and toss gently. Makes about 6 servings.
