





Gate to Texas **Supreme Court**

One of the most important political battles in Texas this year is beginning to emerge in Central Texas. The four seats up for election to the Texas Third Court of Appeals are lining up to be the most important judiciary battles in the state for 2006. Texas Liberal Democrats are plotting their comeback in judicial elections with this court's elections. Conservatives must rise to the challenge.

The Third Court hears all legislative and administrative appeals originating from state government. It is literally the "front gate" to the Texas Supreme Court; it is where many of these types of cases are heard before reaching the Texas Supreme Court. Republicans hold a 4-2 majority on the Third Court; three of the four Republican seats stand for election this year along with an open Democrat

Some consider the 2006 Third Court of Appeals races similar to the battle for the Texas Supreme Court in the early 1990s when Democrats spent millions of dollars before the collapse of the Democrat Party in statewide elections. Now the Democrats have targeted a project called "Four for the Third" to attempt to capture a majority on this very important

Place 2 is held by appointed Republican Justice Alan Waldrop. Waldrop was a respected civil defense lawyer prior to his appointment to the court by Governor Perry. Liberal Democrat Jim Coronado, an Austin Criminal District Court magistrate, is challenging him.

Republican Justice David Puryear holds Place 5. Puryear became a Republican when being a Republican was not cool, switching parties as a matter of principle. Having authored over 700 opinions, he has become the most productive Justice on this court; Puryear is the engine that drives this court. He will be challenged this year by Liberal Democrat Mina A. Brees.

Place 6 is held by Republihear you now, "but I did choose can Justice Bob Pemberton, a my path!" Did you really or did former legal counsel in the circumstances just put you in this Governor's office. He won a narrow victory over Diane Henson in 2004 for an unexpired term. His Democrat opponent this year is Austin attorney Bree Buchanan as he fights for a full six-year term on the Court.

Democrat Henson is now running for the Place 3 seat vacated by Democrat Justice Bea Ann Smith. Henson, an early favorite of liberals, has been endorsed by the Austin Gay and Lesbian Political Caucus. The Republican candidate will be the winner of a four-person race. The early standout is former State District Judge Will Wilson, Jr., a Clements appointee and the son of former Attorney General Will Wilson, Sr. Wilson has captured the endorsement of the Texas Alliance for Life and the Texas Medical Association with a reputation as a strict constructionist who supports the election of judges.

Democrats will be beating the anti-Tom Delay drum in an effort to whip Travis County liberals into frenzy to win these seats. The remainder of this district - San Angelo to LaGrange and Temple to New Braunfels is conservative, and the Democrats will be trying to mask their true ideology.

The voters residing outside of Austin will not look kindly on a Democrat ticket composed of "a bunch of Austin liberals." However, We the People must battle with our time, our money, and our enthusiasm the hundreds of thousands of liberal dollars that Democrats plan to pump into these races.

Public Notice NOTICE OF RULE MAKING HEARING OF THE KINNEY COUNTY GROUNDWATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Directors for the Kinney County Groundwater Conervation District will hold a RULEMAKING HEARING on Monday, March 13, 2006, at 10:00

am., in the Kinney County Courthouse located in Brackettville, Texas.

The proposed rules address several matters, including: Procedural Requirements for Rulemaking and Permitting: The proposed rules are intended to incorporate into the current District rules some of the amendments to the basic law for groundwater districts in Texas, Section Chapter 36 of the Texas Water Code, which were enacted by the Texas Legislature in 2005. The scope of the changes is generally limited to procedures for rule making and for processing of permits. The proposed rules adopt the approach, if not the language, set out in a number of amendments to the law and in related sections of the law, but the proposals also seek to retain the approach the District has used in the past where appropriate and

possible. Substantive Standards for Regular Permits: The proposed rules are the implementation of the Board's decision, incorporated in the Board's Resolution 2006-01 on regular permits and the December 2005 proposal regarding High Impact Regular Permits. The proposed rules seek to establish the details on how such permits would be processed, the requirements on applicants and for permits and the relationship between different categories of permits and other uses of ground-

water. Authorizations for Certain Minor Exceedances: Since there may be unusual instances, 3. such as an unanticipated dry period, where a landowner may need some additional water to finish a crop or protect another agricultural product, the proposed rule provides a basic process for approval of minor exceedances of the amount of water authorized in certain District permits. In short, the amendment would provide that, if there is water available, the District could use a simple process to authorize use of additional water on a one-time basis to avoid economic hard-
