"I would suggest that you use this data as a managerial tool," said Rosenow.

Rosenow also suggested the council meet and amend the current budget using the figures and information from 2004-2005 to create a more realistic financial picture of the City.

The figures used for the current budget were based on estimates because the city did not have any financial records for fiscal years 2001- 2004. "For three years, the City had no data, absolutely none," said Rosenow.

Rosenow briefly summarized the audit, "...you do have assets exceeding your liabilities and in financial terms that is where you want to be. The City, in spite of the last few years, is still currently in that position. The general fund shows a profit and the utility fund shows a loss.
