





person who voiced a concern for the City General Election last Saturday, May 13th, no matter which candidate you supported. I believe that if we follow the two golden rules, first, to "love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, with all thy mind, will and emotions, with all thy means and strength", and secondly, to "love thy neighbor as thyself" then integrity in the voting process will be maintained. Those who consider themselves Christians are called to rejoice with those who rejoice and weep with those who weep. My heart goes out to those who did not win, but I have a word of encouragement for you... "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not unto your own understanding; in all your ways follow Him and He will make your pathway straight." As Election Judge it was my job to make sure each person living in Brackettville, who was eligible to vote, had a chance to do so. I commend the clerks who worked with me for performing an excellent job in a professional manner. I told them that it was now in God's hands who would win and who would not and that this was the time to put aside talking about politics and act only as machines processing the data. I can assure everyone that Sheriff Buddy Burgess was present to see that the key fit the lock to the ballot box and then removed it himself. I can also assure you that the proper paper seal was still on the box when it was delivered to me.

The three clerks who worked with me in the back, Zama Shipman, Elda Terrazas, and Natalie Rodriguez, were able to justify the NUMBER of ballots (not checked votes inside the ballots themselves). before the polls opened, and the number corresponded with the number of people who had signed for voting by Early Voting "IN PER-SON". Also, the "MAIL IN" ballots were checked to see if the signatures on the cards sent out matched the voter (or voter's assistant's) signature on the ballot envelopes. All matched and no ballots were rejected for early voting mail-in.

When the "In Person" voting began at 7 am that morning, we were called by the State to inform us that the day before elections there was a frenzy of people who either had a personal emergency, a family emerchaotic and frantic for a while to quickly fill in the emptied clerk positions. This was accomplished (with the temporary exception of Larry Dodge, whom I found worked for the city), whom I replaced with to come in and work with Martha sue was clarified after talking to the Secretary of States office. > In the front room, Alfred Pena and Martha Martinez checked people's IDs against the Voter Registration List. As long as the person's name was found on that list and living in Brackettville and proper ID was produced, each person was allowed to vote a ballot. There was only one person who was shown on to go out and give curb side voters the Voters Registration List as living at Fort Clark, whose driver's license said he lived in Brackettville. I spoke with the Secretary of State's Office who said that he should have contacted the Registrar's Office at least thirty days prior to the election so that the information could be changed on the Voters Registration List in time for the Election. The State Secretary's lawyer agreed that he should be allowed to vote a Provisional Ballot", which he did.

There was the temporary presence of a concerned candidate in the city hall office, but when asked to step outside, he immediately complied. His concern was that people were not being allowed to vote. sition. I told Deputy Gutierrez that I wanted to make myself available to immediately address any issue that might arise as soon as possible and correct that which needed to be corrected. I told him I wanted to treat others the way I would want to be treated....with genuine concern and respect. I thanked Deputy Gutierrez for being a "Go Between" for these

issues. Later in the day, there were several occasions which, by law, I had a chance to vote with the help of an assistant who was dutifully sworn in not to influence the vote of the voter. During this time I had to take the voter's registration card, have it checked for eligibility to vote against the Voter's Registration List, take the Combination Form paperwork out to the curbside for the voter to vote, swear in their assistant, have the assistant sign an affidavit form, and allow the assistant to assist the voter. Note: After checking with the Secretary of State's office, they concurred that it was legal for an assistant to be someone who was not a registered voter, and (of course) it

made no difference if the assistant was kin to a person on the ballot. The assistant would then carry the ballot back into the building and place it in the ballot box under the watchful eyes of Alfred Pena and Martha Martinez. I was present during each of these steps. I want to thank Bonnie Mayes,

City Secretary, and Custodian of the Records, for her faithfulness to open early and pull out the ballot boxes and records from the city vault, where they had been stored. I thank her and the city for providing food


done while in her presence including the times she had to bring in delayed "MAIL IN" ballots from the post office. It was commendable that at any time she approached the door, she would speak up and request that all counting be stopped while she approached so that integrity could be maintained in the privacy of counting the votes. During this time, the Tally Record Books were closed by the clerks, thus keeping privacy of the ballot count. When Deputy Gutierrez came in later to say people were disturbed that Mrs. Mayes was being allowed to come in, I called the Secretary of State's office who advised that since the state of things were so inflammatory, that it would be best for any future "MAIL IN" ballots, that showed up at the post office, be delivered by an agent from the Sheriff's Office in order to help keep the peace. They stated it would be okay for her to return after the polls closed after 7 pm. so that she could lock the front door. Mrs. Mayes was contacted and graciously agreed to comply so that there not be any contention about her presence at city hall. There was a question about the presence of one party's team being under a tree just inside the posted "Distance Marker". The Secretary of State's office was contacted by Deputy Gutierrez who was told that as long as they were on private property by permission of the

owner, that it was okay for them to remain there. Another person who was in a white vehicle with signs parked on the street within the distance marker was asked to move their vehicle. Some people complained of being harassed in the street as they approached the building to vote. Deputy Gutierrez returned to the scene and advised each. candidate's team present to be sure to act according to law. Finally, after the last person was through voting at 7:00 pm, I checked out-

I applaud her for making sure that the polls were closed since it that there was no counting being was now after 7:00 pm. I was in the process of calling Mrs. Mayes, the Custodian of the Records, to come and lock the front door when I heard her at the back door. I explained to her that we were not through counting the ballots and she quickly agreed to come in through the front door and lock it. Immediately thereafter, she locked the front door and remained locked away from the back room where the clerks where finishing counting the ballots. There were people angry that she was in the front room of the building, so I called the Secretary of State's office and they advised me that as long as she was locked away in the other room, and since she was the legal Custodian of the Records, that it was perfectly legal for her to remain there until we were able to hand her the final records which were legal to present to her. During this time she did not enter until after the ballot box was locked up and presented to Sheriff Buddy Burgess who was present in the back room AFTER all the counting had finished. He also agreed that it was okay for Mrs. Mayes to remain in the front room until we were finished with our reports. Mrs. Mayes did not enter the back room (as can be attested to by Sheriff Burgess) until after the reports were ready to be handed to her. She observed as I placed the locked ballot box in the hands of Sheriff Burgess and Mrs. Mayes placed Box #4, which had items that were legally available to her, in the city safe. The door was locked and everyone left under the watchful eye of Sheriff Burgess. I want to thank everyone for their patience with me and my clerks during this time. I gratefully thank you for the opportunity to serve my community. I hold no guile towards anyone. This is the time for people who have taken offense against each other to forgive each other and place the matter in God's hands. It is a time to pray for those who won the election to walk righteously in the fear of God and to seek His council in all matters so that wisdom rules over the community. Most of all, I pray peace and

When we are annoyed or frustrated with someone it's easy to forget is that there is always a reason that people do what they do. Whatever weirdness you perceive your wife/husband/kid/friend/local politician to be exhibiting, remember that there is always a reason behind their behavior. ### **Geocachers encouraged** tread ligh

trict Annual Report **Groundwater Usage** Submitted by Kinney County Groundwater Conservation Dist.

General Manager Darlene Shahan included a report of annual groundwater usage in Kinney County to the Board of Directors of the Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District during her presentation of the Annual Report at a Regular Meeting held on April 20, 2006.

The Groundwater Usage Report included the total amount of groundwater permitted by the District as well as usage for 2003, 2004, 2005 and a total for those three years. The pumping reports included two major categories: Agricultural Permits and Non-Agricultural Permits.

The Groundwater Conservation District has authorized and permitted a total of 33,856.35 acre feet of water per year in Kinney County for all users. The amount of water authorized and permitted annually for Agricultural use is 33,214.36 acre feet while the amount authorized and permitted annually for Non-agricultural use is 641.99.

2005 Groundwater Usage:

The total amount of groundwater usage reported by all users in 2005 was 4,443.33 acre feet which is about 13 percent of the total groundwater permitted for the year.

The total amount of groundwater usage reported by Agricultural users in 2005 was 3,977.32, which represents less than 12 percent of the water authorized and permitted per year. The total amount of water permitted annually for agricultural use is 33,214.36 acre feet. In 2005, six agricultural users did not file pumping reports and 13 claimed no usage on their pumping reports.

The total amount of groundwater usage reported by Nonagricultural users 2005 was 466.01 acre feet, which is about 73 percent of the total amount of water authorized and permitted for Non-agricultural users per year. The total amount of groundwater permitted annu-ally for use by Non-agricultural user is 641.99. In 2005, all Non-agricultural users filed pumping reports and only one

Marrying high-tech gadgets with rugged outdoor travel, geocaching has become one of the hottest new forms of recreation. But some are warning that its popularity will take a toll on the nation's public land if not done responsibly. In geocaching, participants use global positioning systems (GPS) to direct them to hidden doors. treasures or caches." Caches are usually low-priced trinkets and are most often placed in backcountry settings. There are at least 250,000 caches hidden throughout the world on any given day.

"Unwanted tire tracks, damwildlife can be harsh consequences of irresponsible

geocaching," said Patti Klein, Management. "We encourage trails. geocachers to check with their local land manager for regulations and practice minimum impact behavior at all times."

"Tread Lightly!," a nonprofit organization that educates people to recreate responsibly, recently released tips to help geocachers minimize their impact on the out-

The total amount of groundwater use reported by Agricul-tural in 2003 was 9,868.82, and Non-agricultural use reported was 417.06 acre feet.

In 2003, five Agricultural users did not file pumping reports and six claimed no usage on their pumping reports. In 2003, one Non-agricultural user did not file a pumping report and all others reported usage.

The total groundwater authorized and permitted does not include 928 exempt wells on record with the District as well as the City of Brackettville and the City of Spofford which are exempt users under state law and their usage reports are not part of this Report.

As of October 31, 2003, all wells requiring a permit were required to have a meter or an approved alternative measuring method. A copy of this report can be obtained from the Groundwater District Office.

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
