



If the statement "the average annual amount of evapotranspiration (bet I'd lose a spelling bee contest on this) in Kinney County is 6-9 inches, and out yearly rainfall average for the past two years is 4", we would be starting in the hold to begin with. Prove to us by production testing the Shahan well where the pumping water level is and show us what it does to Las Moras Spring and Pinto Creel/Springs wells! 7. There is no way on this green earth at the present time to prove that we have 172,800 acre feet of groundwater recharge in the northwest quarter, or even the whole, of Kinney County. Stating that we benefit from recharge coming out of Edwards County has yet to be proven. At this time, I doubt very seriously that there is 270,000 acre feet of recharge in Uvalde County. For right now, we have a figure of 69,800 acre feet of recharge from the Texas Water Development Board based on an average yearly rainfall of 22-24 inches. The Water development Board say that they could run a computer model for us using 4' of rainfall but they can't do it at the request of an individual, such as you or me. 
USGS offers information on Las Moras Springs

The United States Geological Survey (USGS) was established by 45th Congress in 1879, under President Rutherford B. Hayes.

The USGS currently works to provide scientific water management information to a variety of private and govermental agencies. USGS employs 10,000 scientists, technicians and support staff in 400 locations throughout the United States. These individuals also collect, monitor, analyze biological, energy and mineral resource information. The chart (at left) represents realtime information collected by the USGS from the Las Moras Springs here in Kinney County at Brackettville every 15-60 minutes and transmitted to the public via satellite, telephone or radio every 1-4 hours. Recording and transmissions may occur more frequently during critical events.
