The Tigers had the football on the Comanche 45, but once again the turnover bug appeared at a most inopportune time. On 1st and ten at the Shiner 45 the Comanche's forced an Ivan Pinales fumble, and from there they mounted an 11-play drive, capped off by a 21-yard Adam Kalich touchdown run. The two-point attempt failed, but Shiner had retaken the lead 12-

The Tigers had to punt on their next possession and the Comanche's were in the drivers' seat once again at their own 37. Shiner again moved into Brackett territory but the drive appeared to stall at the 24- that is, until wideout Derick Richter entered the equation. On 4th and 8 Shiner

I don't know what was said in the Brackett locker room at halftime, but whatever it was, it worked. The Tigers took over at their own 20 to open the second half and moved quickly into scoring position at the Shiner 6. Robert Davis punctuated an impressive drive with a 6-yard touchdown burst on 1st and goal, the black and gold-clad Brackett contingent erupted, and just like that the Tigers were back in the game, advantage Shiner, 22-13.


Shiner had the ball back but couldn't capitalize, and opted to punt on 4th and 1 at their own 45. The Brackett offense took over, and marched methodically to the Comanche 23.
