A surprise award was given to Ronnie and Candy Hobbs for their years of dedicated service to the youth of Kinney County.


"It might take years to get a thank you, but you'll get it," joked emcee Donna Schuster as Candy Hobbs tearfully accepted the special plaque.

Going to work for yourself? Plan ahead

Are you thinking of striking out on your own and joining the growing ranks of the self-employed?

It's an exciting prospect and possibly a little scary.

But you can remove some of the fear by doing whatever you can to prepare yourself financially for life as an entrepreneur.

What steps can you take? Here are a few to consider:

·Save as much as you can. Ideally, you would want to have a couple of years' worth of living expenses saved before you go solo.

But that's a pretty tall order for most people.

And if you have a spouse earning a good income, you may have less need to put away a large sum.

Nonetheless, it's almost always a good idea to save as much as you possibly can before becoming your own boss.

·Think twice before cashing out retirement plan.

If you're leaving a job that provided you with a 401(k), 403(b) or 457(b) plan, you might be tempted to cash out your account to help pay for the transition to the world of selfemployment.

However, try to avoid this move. By liquidating your employer-sponsored plan, you will face early withdrawal penalties if you are younger than 59-1/2, and income taxes, too.

A glacier (GLAY-sure) is a gigantic mass of ice that forms when snow builds up over the years. This snow hardens into ice, and the entire glacier actually can travel slowly across rivers or oceans!

In Norway, a country of 4.6 million people at the northern tip of Europe, glaciers are common. Norway is close

to the freezing Arctic Circle.

Most of its land is covered
by mountains, glaciers, rivers and fjords (pronounced
"fyords"), which are narrow
bodies of water surrounded
by steep cliffs. People cannot
build homes in these areas
of rough terrain. In fact,
Norwegians live on only 30
percent of the country's land,
mostly along the southern
coast.

During the winter, temperatures are cold and snowy, and the sun shines only a few hours each day!





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

Breeding success



Arctic foxes, clad in their thick, pure white winter coats, are specialists in winter wilderness survival. Long hairs on the soles of their feet provide insulation against the

cold and traction on ice. Short ears prevent excessive loss of body heat, and changes in circulation pump more blood to the nose, ears, paws and tail when extra warmth is needed. Such acclimatization allows them to sleep on the snow in comfort despite temperatures that may reach 100 degrees F colder than the norm in summer. Their only visible concession to the cold may be to lie down out of the wind and curl up with the tail covering the nose and paws.

As winter wanes, the dog fox displays enthusiasm for courtship by playfully jumping about the vixen. Showing further readiness to breed, he may make some exploratory digs for a suitable den. After a few rebuffs, the vixen tolerates his advance and permits copulation. By winter's end, digging a den in which to raise their pups becomes both their preoccupation and a capstone to another season's survival.

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Sugar free goodies



Prepared specialty food items are terribly expensive and many times don't taste as good as the price indicates that it should. Ever happen to you too?

Let's have a look at cookies. How many of us eat just one cookie when reaching in the cookie jar? My hand seems to automatically grab three! If they are sugar free store bought, that may be half a package and cost almost half a dollar.

I was asked to do my homework and feature some "S.F." cookies. Here's some goodies to begin with, so get those oven going!

Apricot Oatmeal Bars 1/2 cup all purpose flour 1/2 cup graham cracker

1 cup oats (not instant)

1/2 cup sugar substitute 1/3 cup margarine

3/4 cup low or S.F. apricot preserves

1Tbsp. S.F. brown sugar Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spray an 8 in. square baking pan

with nonstick baking spray. Place flour and the next four ingredients in a food processor. Pulse several times until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Press two thirds, or about two cups, of the mixture into the prepared baking pan. Bake for 15 minutes. Remove from oven and spread preserves over hot crust.
