My dad is fine and I want to thank those of you that stopped in the office to check on him. He's back home and upset that he missed dinner with the grandkids.

(For those of you who don't know- my dad had a little accident on his skateboard - no this is not a typo - I do mean skateboard - like wide as a surfboard with big knobby tires and a digital remote.)

I do however want to give special thanks everyone at EMS, KCSO and Fort Clark RV for coming to my dad's aid. He took a powerful blow to the head, but is expected to make a full recovery.

Reality Check

I was sitting with BuJean (my step-mom) in the waiting room at Wilford Hall in San Antonio quietly waiting for word on my father. Across the room were two ladies that were already in the room when we sat down a few minutes earlier. Suddenly one of the ladies picks up her cell phone, dials a number and tells her daughter that her dad just died.

The room was small so I couldn't help but hear every word, I could even hear the woman on the other end of the cell phone fall apart.

I put my chin to my chest because the tears were filling my eyes and I knew I couldn't hold them back a second longer. I was crying for this woman and for a voice on a cell phone.

The woman later told me that her husband knew that he wasn't going to make it through his surgery and died before he ever got into the operating room.

Life is precious.



If you are thinking of switching jobs - especially in mid-tolate career - you'll want to pay careful attention to the benefits offered by your new employer. At this stage of your life, you've got a lot to protect.

For starters, you'll need to take a close look at your new employer's retirement plan. If your new job comes with a 401(k), find out when you'll be eligible to contribute, if there's an employer match and if the match also applies to "catch-up" contributions you can make after age 50. You'll also want to find out if your new plan will accept a rollover of your old 401(k). If it does, and if you like the investment options that come with your new plan, you may want to make this move.

In any case, if your new job does offer a 401(k), take full advantage of it. Contribute as much as you can afford and increase your contributions whenever you get a raise. Look carefully at your investment options and spread your money among them in a way that reflects your risk tolerance, long-term goals and time horizon.
