

During the 13th century, buttons were handmade from metals like gold, silver and copper, as well as tortoise shells and animal bones.

By the 16th century, cheaper materials were used, like wood, tin, brass and iron. But kings and gueens wanted to make sure their buttons were special, so they commanded button makers to use jewels and gold.

Buttons came to America in the 1700s after families left Europe to settle here. By the mid-1800s, companies invented

machines that could produce hundreds of buttons a day. These machines would stamp designs

disks - a process that made buttons much more affordable for shop-

In 1872, John Wesley Hyatt of New Jersey invented a plastic known as "celluloid," which turned out to be a perfect material for inexpensive button-making.
