

Rollover accident takes life of local co-op employee

Santos DeHoyos, 29, of vehicle rollover accident on Highway 1024, on April 24.

DeHoyos, an employee of Rio Grande Electrical Cooperative, Inc. (RGEC), was report- lows: Visitation will be held Brackettville. edly traveling towards Hwy. 90 after completing a service call in the Panhandle area, when the company-owned truck he was operating slid across the road on a deep curve.

According to Senior Deputy Jose Blancarte of the Val Verde Sheriff Department, DeHoyos was ejected from the driver's side door after the right side tires hit an embankment and caused the truck to roll approximately 3 to 4 times.

Blancarte stated DeHoyos suffered severe head trauma and was pronounced dead at the scene by Val Verde Justice of the Peace Joey Gonzalez at 2:45 p.m.

DeHoyos leaves behind a wife, Savanah Massingill DeHoyos, and a two year old daughter.

Santos worked for RGEC for more than five years, and most recently was the Brackettville meter reader.

RGEC General Manager and CEO Daniel Laws stated, "Santos was a valued employee who was full of life and always wore a smile. He will be sorely missed. He was a big guy with an equally big heart, and was loved by all of us. His passing has affected each of us on a very personal level. He was not just a co-worker, he was a friend.

RGEC has established a trust fund for Santos' and Savanah's daughter, Solana, at the Bank & Trust Brackettville Branch.

Most performed search and rescue operations, while others treated the survivors of the twister that flattened one elementary school, destroyed more than 600 homes and killed 9, including one

Dye Testing Progress Report As of Wednesday, April 11, the dye that was injected into the Alamo Cave and the HF&F Sinkhole/cave on March 9th had not shown up in the any of the weekly samples obtained since March 10th. 



To achieve your financial goals, you need to be a diligent saver and investor. But you need to do more than just build your assets - you also must do a good job of managing your debts. If you let your debts get out of control, they will eventually erode your savings and investments - and when that happens, the road to financial success can get pretty bumpy. Unfortunately, your fellow Americans are doing a poor job of saving money and staying out of debt. Here are some telling statistics:

Debt is rising. By September 2006, household debt had reached 130.9 percent of disposable income, according to the Center for American Progress. In plain English, that means we owe about a third more than we have available to spend after we've paid our taxes and met our expenses.

Savings have fallen. For most of 2005 and all of 2006, the personal savings rate was negative, according to the U.S. Commerce Department. Previously, we haven't had a negative savings rate since the Great Depression. In short, we've gotten into the habit of spending more than we

These grim figures foretell a discouraging financial future for many of us. Every dollar you pay for debt is a dollar you can't use to invest. Furthermore, if you have too little in savings, you may well be forced to dip into your existing investments to pay for short-term needs, such as a car repair or an expensive new appliance. And the more you take from your investments today, the less you will have available tomorrow - when you might need the money to help pay for retirement or your

While you're taking steps to cut your costs, you can still add to your investments. How? For starters, increase your contributions to your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan every time you get a raise. Until you retire, you generally won't be able to access this money without taking a big tax hit, so you won't be tempted to "raid" your 401(k) to pay off debts. [You can, however, typically take loans from a 401(k) or similar account.] You also may want to "pay yourself first." Each month, before you pay the mortgage, the utility companies and your other obligations, set aside an amount for your investments. It's easier if you set up a bank authorization to move the money directly into the investment you choose. By having the money taken out this way, you are less likely to "miss" it - and, hopefully, you'll be less likely to look at it as a source of funding for your daily life. By cutting your debts, boosting your 401(k) contributions and paying yourself first, you can help yourself get a firmer grip on your financial situation - today and tomorrow.

By Jocko Apuck is a hard rub-ber disk used in ice hockey.



¡Varias exenciones de residencia pueden rebajar sus impuestos de propiedad!

¿Quién califica para una exención?

Cualquier dueño de una residencia principal el día 1º de enero tiene derecho a una exención de residencia de \$15,000 este año para rebajar sus impuestos escolares... y no importa si la residencia es casa, condominio o casa móvil. Los condados, ciudades y distritos especiales de impuestos tambien pueden ofrecer exenciones de residencia.

¡Hay otras exenciones?

Si Ud. está incapacitado-o si tiene 65 años o más-tiene derecho a una exención adicional de \$10,000 en sus impuestos escolares de propiedad. Y si califica para la exención de 65 años de edad o más o está incapacitado, tambien tiene derecho a un "tope" permanente en sus impuestos escolares de residencia. ¿Debo solicitarla cada año?

No. Si recibió una exención de residencia en el 2006, no hay necesidad de solicitaria de nuevo en el 2007—a menos que se lo pida su jefe de valoraciones. Sin embargo, si no ha recibido una exerción en su resi-dencia actual—o si ha cambiado de domicilio tendrá que solicitar una exención para el 2007. Si cumple 65 años durante este año, tiene hasta un año de esa fecha para solicitar una nueva exención. Si resultó incapacitado, tendrá que solicitar la exención de personas incapacitadas.







"Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber—not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2007 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

¡"La valoración productiva" puede reducir los impuestos de su terreno agrícola, ganadero o maderero!

La ley de Texas permite a los granjeros, rancheros y madereros pagar sus impuestos de propiedad basándose en "la valoración productiva" del terreno calificado—o sea en su habilidad de producir cosecha, ganado o madera—y no de su valor en el mercado actual. Y esto le puede ahorrar en sus impuestos de propiedad.

¿Cual es la fecha límite?

Si su terreno nunca ha tenido una valoración productiva, o si Ud. es nuevo dueño, debe solicitaria a su distrito de valoraciones antes del día 30 de abril, para recibir el beneficio en sus impuestos de propiedad del 2007. Puede recibir hasta 60 días más si tiene una buena razón y si solicita el tiempo adicional antes del 30 de abril del 2007. Si se pasa de esta fecha, es posible que todavia la pueda obtener, pero pagará una multa. Pregunte en la oficina de su distrito de valoraciones.

¿Debo solicitarla cada año?

Por lo general, si su propiedad ya recibe una valoración productiva agrícola o maderera, no hay necesidad de pedir una nueva cada año—a menos que se lo pida su jefe de valoraciones. Si se requiere una solicitud nueva, el distrito de valoraciones le mandará un aviso por correo.
