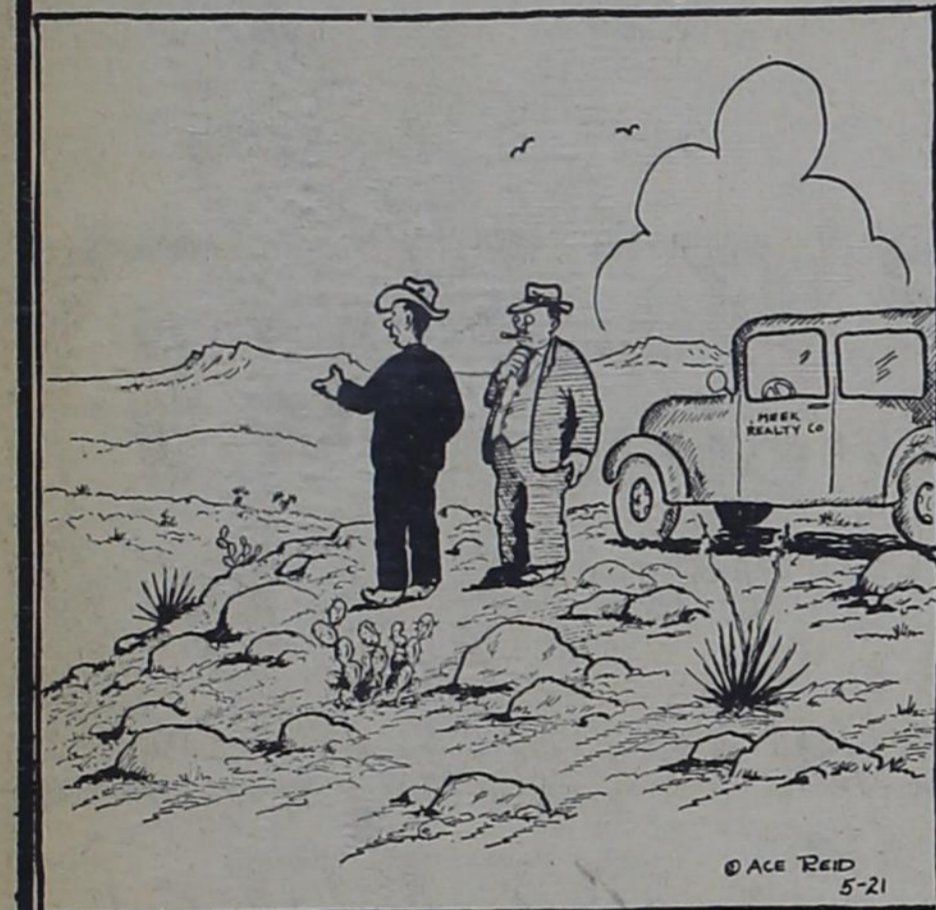
At Farwell --

Jones of Farwells says the meeting will be similar to the one to be held in Lubbock May 24. He urges people of Parmer County to attend both the Farwell and Lubbock meetings.

Medical Clinic --

Fund-Raising Meet Planned Saturday

An information meeting of advance campaign workers with the fund-raising committee of Bovina Clinic Fund will be at 7 a.m. Saturday in Bovina Restaurant, according to Alfred Moody, chairman of the committee.

The campaign to raise \$50,000 for the building of a medical clinic and securing a doctor here will be divided into two campaigns, Moody said, the advance and the general campaigns.

Everyone in Bovina and trade area will be contacted during the two drives to raise \$50,000.

About 18 persons will conduct the advance campaign in the near future. Purpose of the meeting Saturday is to give these workers the information they need before contacting the public, Moody said.

Citizens may either buy certificates of indebtedness in multiples of \$25 outright, or may make a pledge to be called for when needed for construction of the clinic, Moody explained. However, citizens do not have to wait to be contacted. They may arrange for the purchase of the certificates at any time at First State Bank of Bovina.

Already contributed by Joe F. Langer and family is a half block of land on which to build the clinic. The land is located near the Oklahoma Lane road on the edge of Bovina.

Under the Sears-Roebuck Foundation plan, for which Bovina qualified, those buying the certificates of indebtedness will "get their money back" from rent of the clinic or upon sale of such to a doctor.

After Bovina raises the \$50,000, Sears-Roebuck Foundation will go to work to secure a doctor for the town.

The project started after Bovina Jaycees canvassed the town to determine the community's greatest need. It was adopted by the Bovina Woman's Study Club and has been aided by almost every civic organization and church of the community and area.

After a medical survey was conducted in November and Bovina qualified for the Sears-Roebuck Foundation program, supervision and guidance has been furnished by the Foundation and Norinan Davis, director, who spoke here to towns people.

Percentage Unknown --

Freeze Hurts Wheat Crop

Late freeze has damaged the 1967 wheat crop, but to what extent will not be known until harvest, so say grain elevator men in Bovina.

Together with dry weather, insects, wind and freeze, the wheat harvest is definitely expected to be below average, Harry Johnson at Sherley Grain Co. said this week.

"The damage is spotted," according to Bo Bartley of Bovina Wheat Growers. Where cold settled in low spots the damage is greater than on fields on higher ground. Some of the wheat that was grazed late did not receive extensive damage, Bartley said.

Johnson says that no one knows the extent of damage, as farmers guess all the way from 10 to 50 per cent. He also says the wheat damage is spotted.

Crops were hit the second time Sunday night when the thermometer dropped below the freezing mark.

Strangely enough, however, according to the elevator men, the cotton already up apparently was not damaged.

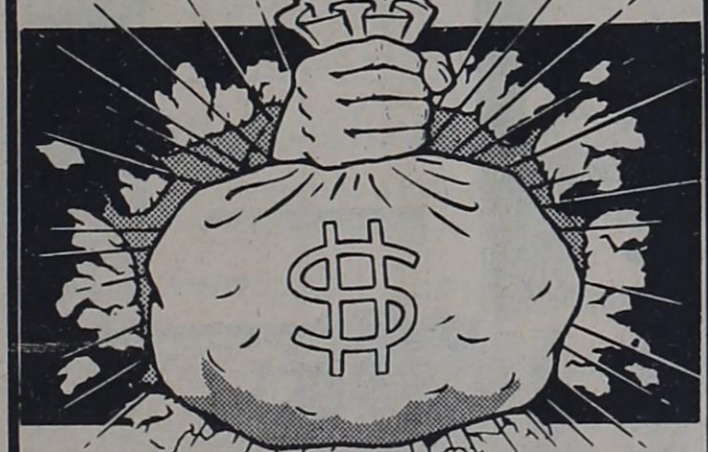
Claytons Have Son

If we could solve the baby sitting problem, I feel that Extension Service could do much more for the younger homemaker in her important role as "homemaker". In the meantime I want to encourage homemakers who cannot attend meetings to make use of available information through bulletins and news releases.

One of the reasons I chose an Extension Service career is that I like to learn new things, and the work has demanded that I keep up-to-date on all phases of homemaking.

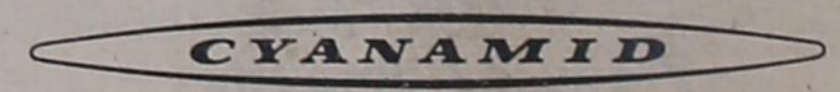

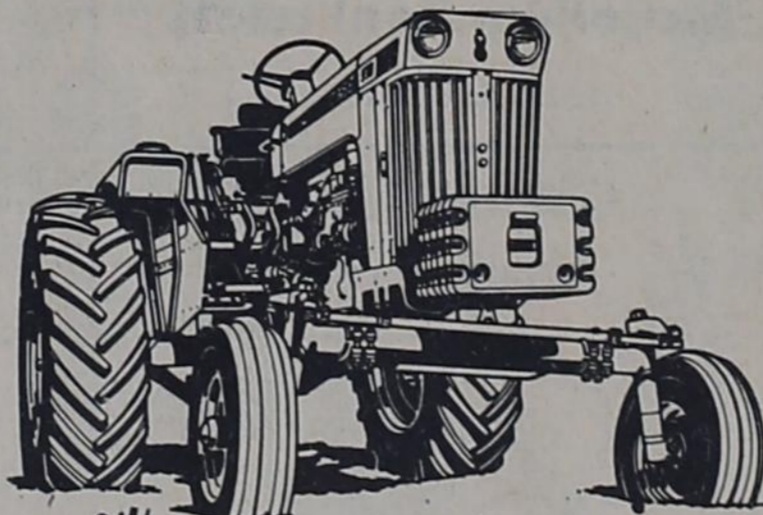

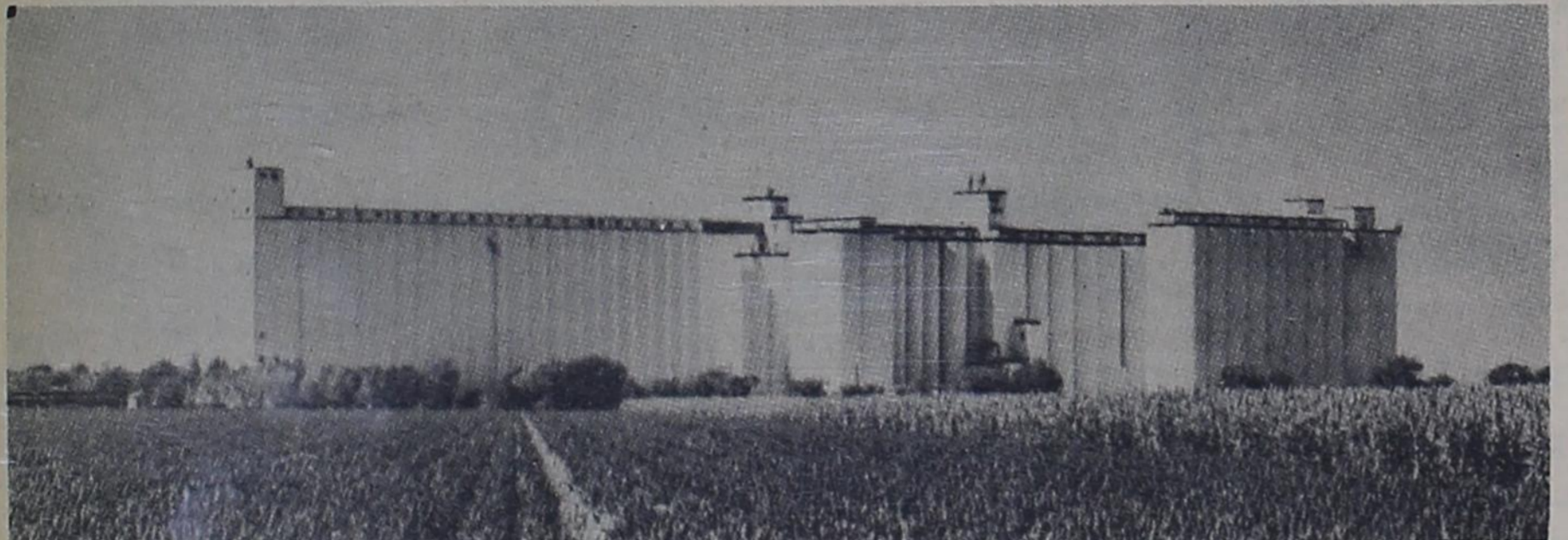

Schools Not Allowed To Distribute Food

Bovina Independent School District has been notified by the United States Department of Agriculture that in case of disaster, commodities will not be available to the public through the cafeterias of schools participating in the National School Lunch program.

"Commodities may be made available to disaster organizations for distribution to disaster victims. Commodities acquired under Section 6 of the National School Lunch Act, however, are restricted to use by schools participating in the National School Lunch Program," a letter from Howard P. Davis, deputy administration of Consumer Food Programs said.

When participating schools release commodities for disaster feeding, "Section 6 commodities are considered to have been improperly distributed or used," the letter continued.

Sometimes when disasters occur in a community, the citizens look to the school to provide food, Otis Spears, superintendent said. However, he explained that cafeteria are not allowed by the United States

Department of Agriculture to concur with such a request. Such food would be distributed through disaster agencies.

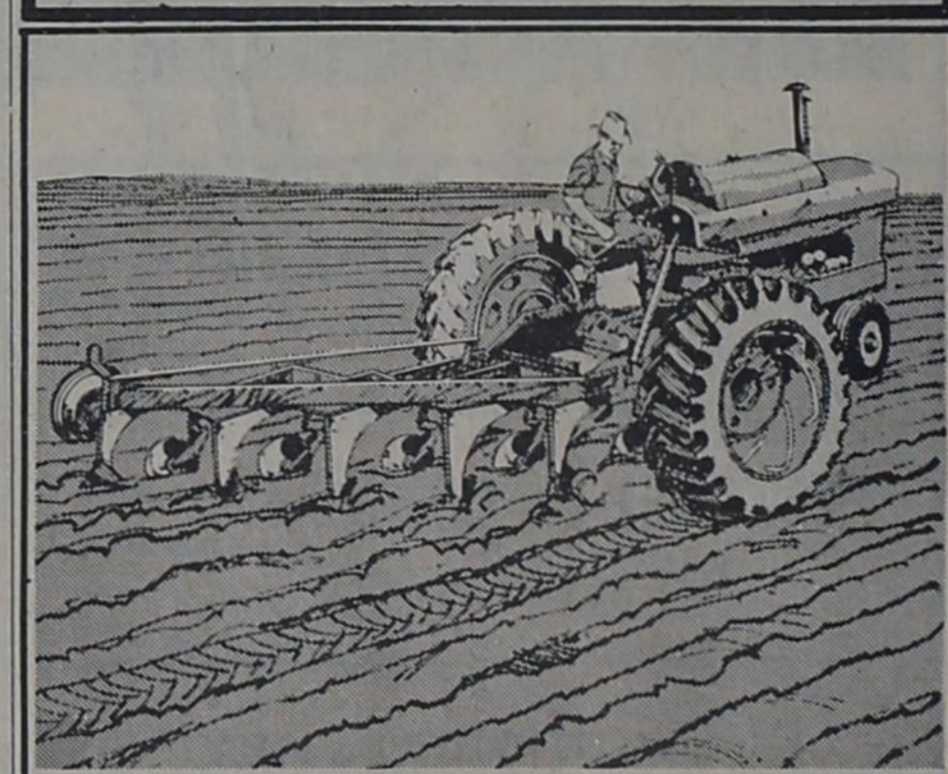

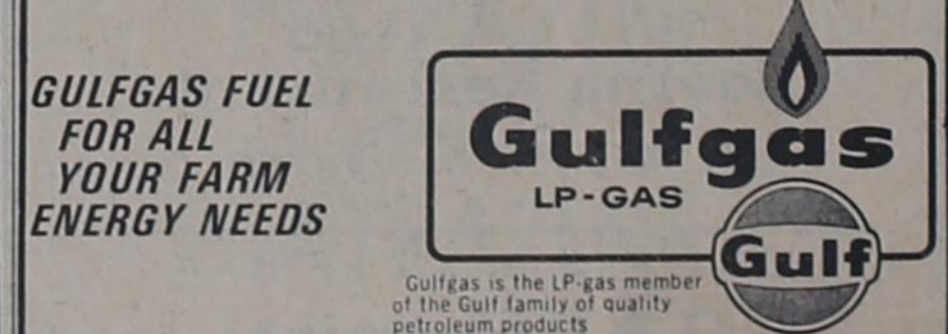
