

Jesus in his sermon on the Mount. What does the word "heart" mean in such passages? Does it meanthat organ in a man's body that pumps blood? If it does not mean this, then why should a person pat himself on the breast and say I know I am saved because I feel it right here? We can learn what the Bible heart is by what it does, It thinks, Matt. 9:4; it imagines, Gen. 6:5; it can hold good or evil, Matt. 12:35; it reasons, Mark 2:8; it has intentions or decides to do something, Heb. 4:12; it understands and believes, Matt. 13:15, "For this people's heart is waxed gross, and their ears are dull of hearing, and their eyes they have closed; lest at any time they should see with their eyes, and hear with their ears, and should understand with their heart, and should be converted, and I should heal them." MILO DEMONSTRATION TEST PLOT




