## Former JP pleads guilty

Only minutes from the start of his trial by jury, former Kinney County Justice of the Peace John Ford III, accused of theft by a public servant, made a deal with the great State of Texas on July 24.

Ford stood before District Judge Tom Lee, listened to the explanation of his rights and then quietly entered his plea of, "Guilty," to theft of a public servant; only one of the two charges pending against him.

The former judge, popular with the local golfing set, was indicted in December, 2005, after clerks, working under his employ, sus-

pected he was stealing money paid to the Justice of the Peace (JP) Court for traffic violations issued by Department of Transportation Troopers and local sheriff deputies.

According to the investigation reports completed by Texas Ranger Sgt. Coy Smith and submitted to the court by District Attorney Fred Hernandez, Ford cashed money orders made payable to him in his capacity as JP and then later attempted to cover up his crime by fabricating a money order.

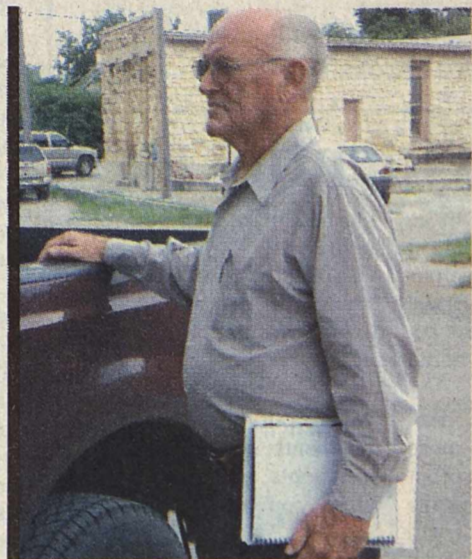
In one of several documented incidents, Randal Johnson of Boynton Beach, Florida called the JP's office on August 16, 2004, in reference to a notice detailing the suspension of his driver's license due to the non-payment of a citation he received while traveling through Kinney County on July 14, 2004.

Johnson claimed he had made payment to the court by way of a money order, but after searching the JP's database, the clerks maintained that no payment had been received.

Johnson then requested a "tracer" on the money order and faxed the results to the JP's office. The money order bore Ford's signature, "indicating that it had been cashed for cash," on August 2, 2004, the report revealed.

Aware that a search was on for Johnson's payment information, but unaware Johnson had already faxed in proof of payment, Ford produced \$165 cash on August 30, 2004. Ford, attempting to resolve the issue, announced, "that Johnson had made payment over the week

## Water board settlement winners and losers, Taxpayers possibly protected from big payout

Attempting to end a years long battle with a water pail full of plaintiffs, the Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District met with professional mediator, Joseph H. Hart, at the law office of Louis T. Rosenberg in San Antonio, to put a cap on its legal obligations by participating in a voluntary mediation session last Tuesday.

According to the mediation agreement, the water district has agreed to settle with the Plaintiffs Toledo P. Boulware, Individually and as Trustee, Dos Angeles, LP/Justin Burk dba Burk Farms & Robert

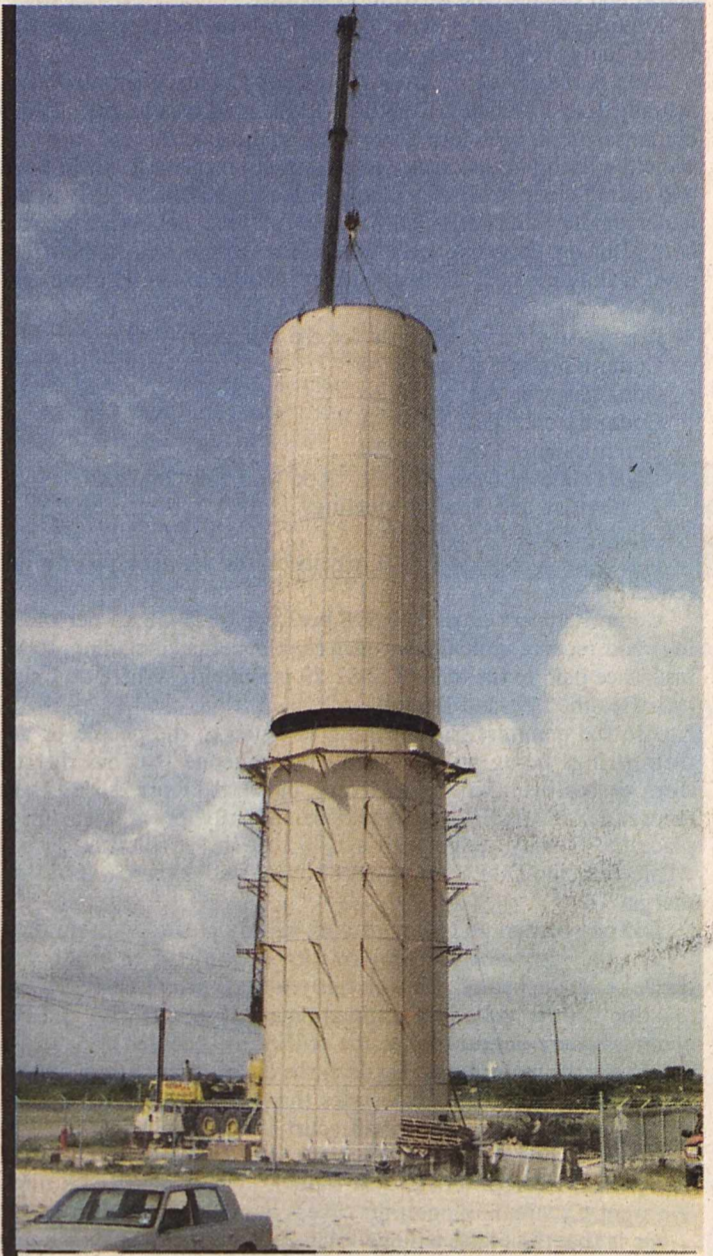
E. Condry, Zach and Kayla Davis, DMC Partners, Ltd., Willie Jo Dooley LP, Hayden G Haby & Doris Y. Haby, Hayden G. Haby Jr. & Dennette Haby Coates, Ben Jones Jr. Estate, Ben Jones Sr. Estate, McDaniel Farms, Inc. and Jewel F. Robinson (and Four S Ranch) after more than three years in court.

If the Plaintiffs agree to withdraw their state case against the District, the District would then permit each of them higher amounts of water each year,

which are the amounts the Plaintiffs claimed to have proven in their permit hearings in 2004. The Plaintiffs challenged the District's authority to assess certain fees in regards to the permitting process and for its failure to issue the permits in a timely manner once a decision about their permits had been made.

The District, in the settlement, also agreed to, "not unreasonably withhold processing

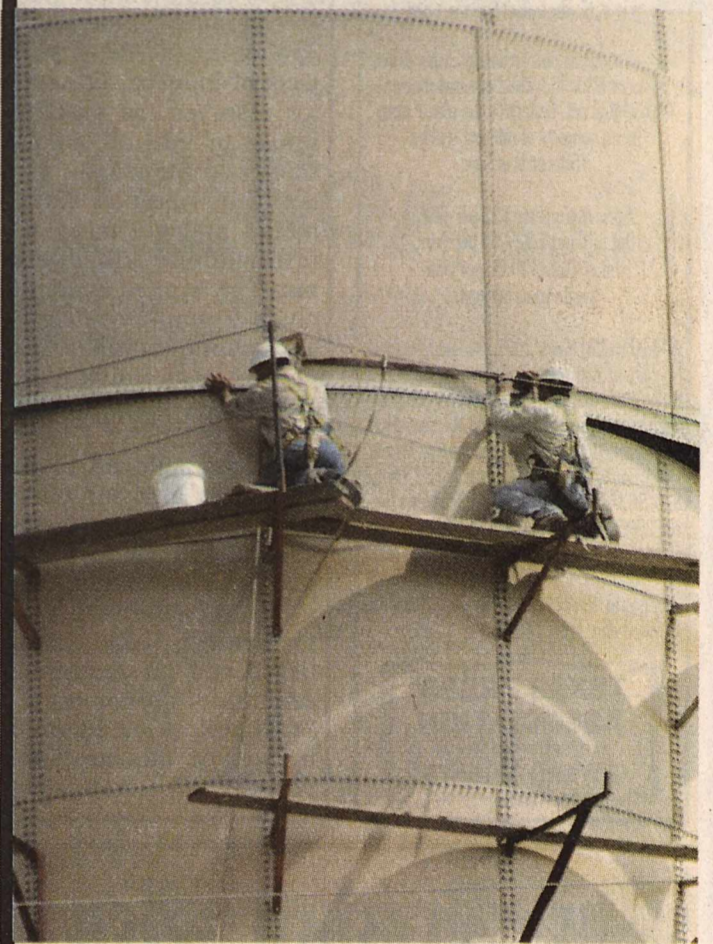

## Protect yourself from identity theft

First, the bad news: There's still plenty of identity theft out there. Now, the better news: There's not as much as in previous years. And now, the best news: You can do a lot to protect yourself from being victimized.

If you're not familiar with the concept of identity theft, it basically involves someone getting some pieces of information about you - name, Social Security number, credit card numbers, "pre-approved" credit card offers - and using this data to make purchases or withdraw funds from your accounts.

In 2006, some 8.4 million Americans were hit by identity fraud - but that's half a million fewer victims than the year before, according to a study conducted by Javelin Strategy & Research.

The study also found that, in

2006, the average victim of an existing account fraud paid \$587, out of pocket, in consumer costs associated with the fraud, while victims of new accounts opened in their name paid, on average, \$617.

The overall decline in identity theft may indicate that more people are acting to protect themselves - but the average cost per person shows that fraud victims still can get hurt. How can you reduce the chances of being victimized by identity theft? Here are some suggestions:

- Shield your credit card from prying eyes and ears. Thieves can now use camera cell phones to take photos of your credit cards while you're making purchases. Don't pull your credit card out from your wallet or purse until the moment you're going to use it, and put it away after it's used. If you're making a contribution over the phone to a political or non-profit group, don't give out your credit card number unless you're sure the organization is legitimate.
- Use secure sites when shopping online. Before giving out your credit card number to make a purchase on the

Internet, make sure you're on a secure site - one that begins with https://. (The "s" stands for "secure.") Also, the site should display a small lock or other security seal.

- Shred those documents. If you are purging old investment statements, tax returns and bank documents, use a shredder. And while you have the shredder out, use it on pre-approved credit card offers.

- Go "virtual". Try to replace paper statements - from banks, financial services providers and credit card issuers - with online versions. Many businesses will be quite happy to save the cost and expense of mailing account statements to you.

- Check your bank statements. Whether you get your bank statements online or on paper, check them at least a few times a month. If you find a transaction that looks unfamiliar or questionable, call your bank to find out more details.

- Get your credit report annually - To request a copy of your credit report, you can call the three main credit bureaus: Equifax (1-800-685-1111), Experian (1-888-397-3742) and Trans Union (1-800-888-4213). Check your report closely for "surprises" or unaccounted activity.

- Guard your personal information. Don't carry around your Social Security card in your wallet. In fact, unless it's truly necessary, as when you're filing official papers, don't give out your Social Security number. Also, change the PIN number on your cash card once in a while.

Identity thieves are clever - so do whatever it takes to keep them out of your life.

## Young geoscientists explore Uvalde County geology

Area ninth graders explored some of the rich geology in Uvalde County on July 9-10 as participants in Young Geoscientists, a two-day field study sponsored as part of the GeoFORCE Texas Program.

Students representing 10 Southwest Texas school districts including Brackettville, Del Rio, Dilley, Eagle Pass, Hondo, La Pryor, Nueces Canyon, Pearsall, Rocksprings and Uvalde, took part in this year's field study.

Mike Flores and Haley Hale represented Brackettville at the recent event hosted by Southwest Texas Junior College (SWTJC).

Sponsored by SWTJC and the University of Texas at Austin's Jackson School of Geosciences, with corporate support from Shell, ExxonMobil, Chevron, BP, Marathon, ConocoPhillips, Minerals Management Service, Alcoa Foundation, AT&T Founda-

tion, Dominion Exploration, Halliburton, Schlumberger, Swift Energy and Vulcan Materials Foundation, the Young Geoscientists program is aimed at recruiting prospective geoscientists from the 11-county area served by SWTJC.

"This field study gives students a chance to learn about some of the exciting geological sites and formations right in their own backyard," said SWTJC Dean of Technology and Institutional Advancement Blaine Bennett. "Hopefully this will inspire them to look into further study of the geosciences."

According to Bennett, the Young Geoscientists class continues to grow as word spreads of the informative instruction available through the program.

"The first year we had 24 students and this year we had 42

participants," Bennett said. "The word is definitely getting out that this is a fun and educational program."

Sigrid Clift, geologist for the Jackson School's Bureau of Economic Geology, Shell geologist Orlando Ortega and Jackson School graduate students Jessica Gordon and program coordinator Cristina Rodriguez, directed the instruction.

Clift and fellow scientist Jay Roney of the Jackson School, also wrote and designed a 30-page guidebook presented to each participant.

The Vulcan Materials rock quarry in Knippa and the Vulcan Materials Uvalde plant west of town, Ft. Inge and the Annandale Ranch bat cave, were among the sites toured during the two-day event.

Students learned about river ecology and the Edwards Aquif-

er with stops along the Leona, Frio and Nueces rivers. Scott Rogers of the University of Texas at Austin also gave students a 3-D virtual tour of the Edwards Aquifer.

A closing session was held on the SWTJC Uvalde campus. Program participants received a certificate of completion, a GeoFORCE Texas t-shirt, a Shell cap and a rock kit.

"This was a great group of students. They were attentive and asked lots of good questions," said Young Geoscientists coordinator Cristina Rodriguez. "I know they went home with an increased awareness of the area's geology and that's what we were shooting for."

Participants in this year's Young Geoscientists program will be invited back next summer for a two-day field study in Port Aransas, Texas.

## Water board settlement detailed

and approval of export permits; provided however, that the investigation and further definition of water resources available within Kinney County and the surrounding region provide a reasonable basis for the approval of such export permits. Further, the District shall review and develop a new Groundwater Management Plan, conducting public hearings thereon and completed by the District not later than March 1, 2008."

The attorneys for the Plaintiffs will also be paid by provisions that were intended to protect county taxpayers from having to directly foot the entire half-million dollar bill. The document reads, "(a) payment shall be due and owing by the District to the Plaintiffs only from export fees, if and when, imposed and collected by the District; provided further, that such obligation for fees to be paid shall be an obligation to be satisfied from (fifty percent) of annual export fees collected; (b) the amount of Plaintiffs' attorneys fees shall not accrue interest; and (c) Plaintiffs' attorneys fees shall be discounted (fifteen percent) from the total amount incurred by Plaintiffs through this date, July 17, 2007, which amount shall be provided by Plaintiffs' attorneys Hazen & Terrill, P.C., and Jackson, Sjoberg, McCarthy and Wilson in the a total sum not to exceed \$550,000."

Ranchers Hugh and Dennette Coates filed a suit against the District in federal court in September, 2006, charging the KCGCD, several past and present board directors and former district General Manager Darlene Shahan willfully interfered with their right to pump water on their property. The Coateses agreed to withdraw their federal suit in exchange for being issued their water permit.

Beth Ann Smith, a current water board director, sued the

District and former General Manager Darlene Shahan in November, 2006, for withholding documents that she should have been privy to in her capacity as a director. In that petition, Smith also charged Darlene Shahan was attempting to prevent the public from knowing the District's poor financial condition.

John Boerschig and Tully Shahan, defendant-intervenor, asserted themselves into the case in January of this year by claiming, "property interest and other interests in protection of the groundwater, springs, and resulting surface waters in Kinney County." Although the pair reportedly did not participate in hearings or meetings following their filing, they, by law, were included in the mediation. Boerschig and Shahan agreed to not take any further legal action and in return, the District will increase their existing water permits to amounts up to three times originally permitted. In addition, Boerschig requested the restrictions and conditions on one of his permits be lifted; thus freeing him from providing progress reports to the KCGCD and plugging off a well on his property drilled, but not producing. Additionally Shahan requested a reclassification of his current permits; a change that would give more protection to his future pumping.

Not included in the mediation proceedings, but still a big winner in the potential settlement, Former General Manager Darlene Shahan will be released from her liability in the myriad of lawsuits, as she was named individually and in her capacity as the general manager of the District. Darlene Shahan resigned her position in November, 2006.

The mediated agreement still has to pass with the majority vote from the KCGCD and be signed off on by District Judge Mickey Pennington.

end and the money would be brought from the jail."

After Ford was arrested for fabricating physical evidence and for theft by a public servant last winter, the report disclosed he, "provided a statement admitting that he had stolen money from his office." Ford

cited personal financial troubles as his reasons for his actions, but did not say how much money he had stolen.

No date was set for Ford's formal sentencing, but if Judge Lee upholds the arrangements made in the plea agreement, Ford will not spend time in jail and be expected to pay only minimal fines and restitution.

With this in mind, here are some hints to help you enjoy the outdoors and other activities of the season.

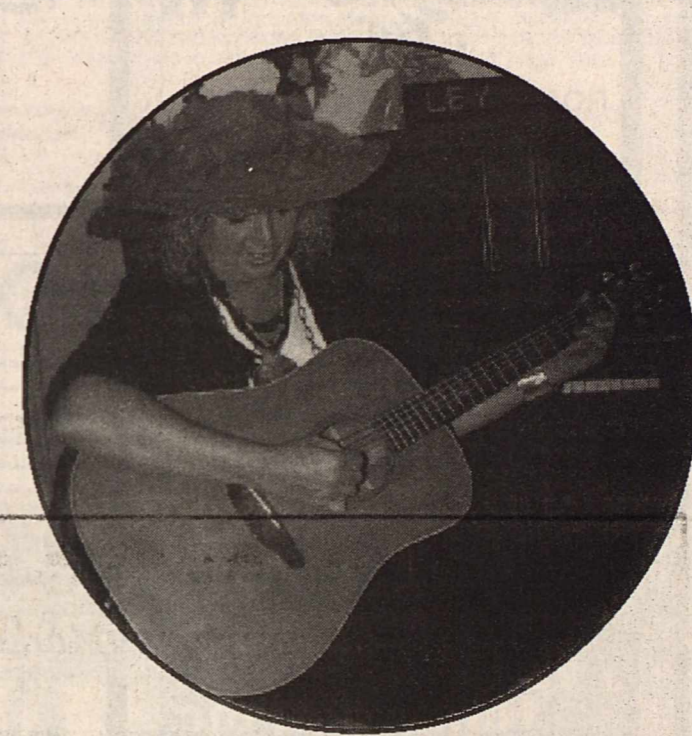

#### Easy adjustment for good chipping

When setting up for a chip shot, many players forget to lean forward at address, which makes feel and consistency very difficult. At address you should play the ball in the middle of your stance, and your chest should feel like it is ahead of the ball. You will have more weight on your left foot. This will enable the club head to strike the ball at the low point of the stroke, which results in crisp, solid contact. By ensuring your set-up is correct each time, it will be easier to duplicate a good chipping stroke. The result is better consistency and closer chip shots.

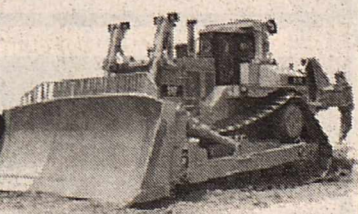

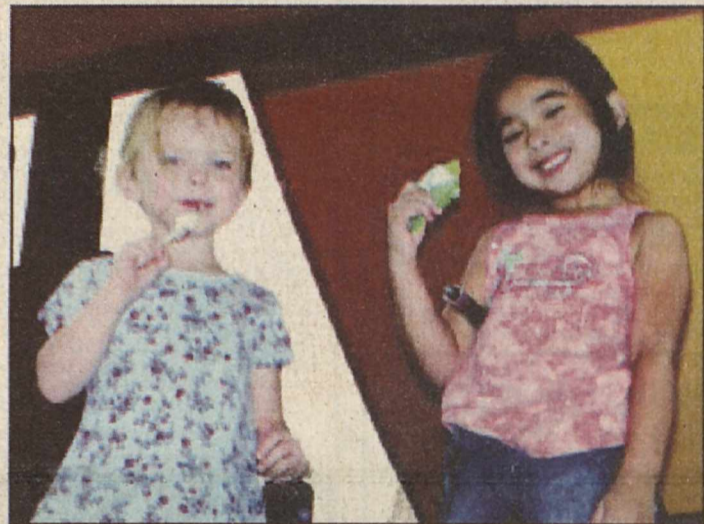
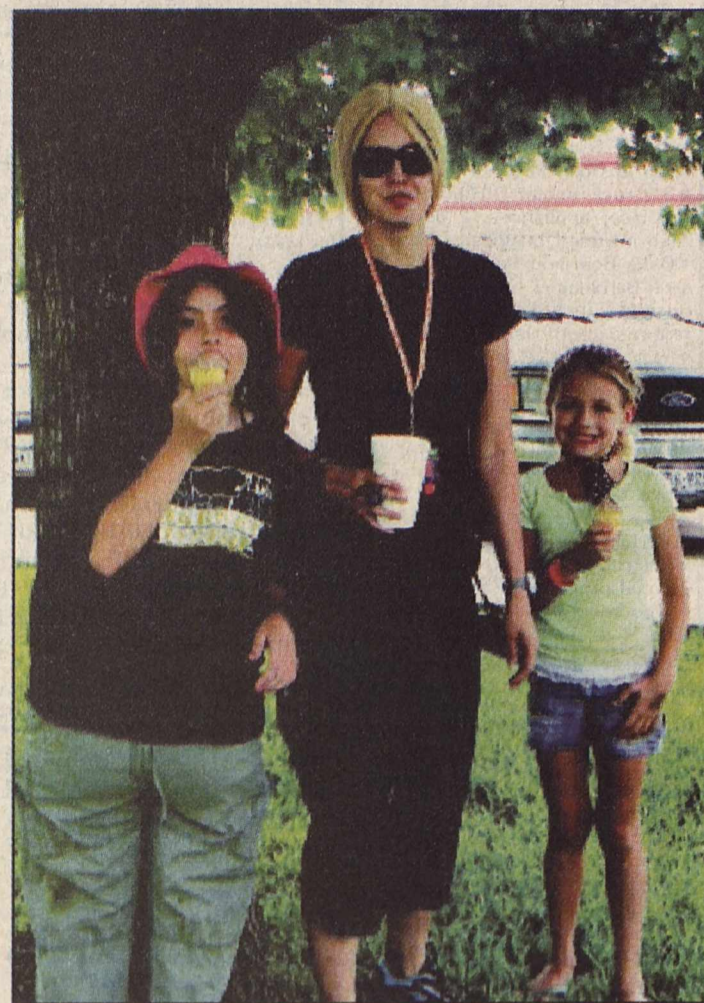
