Fort Clark man assaults local youth

A punch in the mouth sends Kielhorn back to the pokey

Wallee James Kielhorn, 52, was arrested on September 21, after punching a local 18-year-old in the face.

Reports obtained from the Kinney County Sheriff's Department (KCSO) stated the victim, whose name is being withheld because he is a high school student, was washing a recreational vehicle (RV) at the Fort Clark Springs RV Park, when Kielhorn approached him with a golf club in his hand and threatened to beat him.

The teenager responded to the threat by reportedly telling Kielhorn to, "go away" and

Kielhorn consented, but returned a short time later, pushed the youth against the side of the RV and punched him in the mouth. A short struggle ensued and Kielhorn was again told to leave. Kielhorn left the scene again and the owner of the RV called 911.

Local authorities were dispatched to the park and after completing interviews with all involved parties, deputies placed Kielhorn under arrest at his residence in the RV Park.

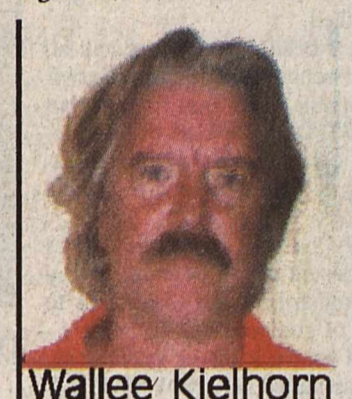
Kielhorn was charged with resisting arrest, assault, public intoxication and making terroristic threats and booked into the Kinney County Jail at 7 p.m.

Kielhorn, reportedly living in Kinney County since October, 2006, was most recently arrested in June for failure to register as a sex offender in the State of Texas.

Kielhorn was convicted of a sexual offense against a female child in Rhode Island in 1988 and according to Texas Code of Criminal Procedure, Chapter 62, Article 62.051, is required to register with local law enforcement where he resides or intends to reside for more than seven days and did not do so. Authorities uncovered his conviction and subsequent failure to register after complaints that Kielhorn behaved in an in-

appropriate manner towards two minor children at the Fort Clark Pool this past summer.

Kielhorn was magistrates and released the same day after posting three, \$1,200 bonds.

Hunter Education Class set for Brackettville

A Hunter Education Training Course has been set to begin Monday, October 1, 2007. The course will continue on Tuesday, October 2, Monday Oct. 8 and conclude on Tuesday, October 9, 2007. Registration for the 4 evening class will be Monday night at 6:30PM, followed by class until 9:30PM each night. Classes will be held at Brackett High School, Annex Room 5 (Science Room) in Brackettville, entrance off of Fulton Street, across from the new high school building. The cost is only \$10.00 per person. The class is a 12 hour course needed for certification. Everyone must attend all 12 hours to successfully complete the course and be certified. Every hunter born on or after September 2, 1971, must successfully complete a Hunter Education Training Course. Hunters of all ages are welcome to attend. A parent or other relative is encouraged to attend with their child. The minimum age of certification is 12 years old. In other words, you must be 12 years old at the start of the course. If you are a hunter and you are 17 or older and born after September 2, 1971, you must have this course to hunt. You will receive a citation if you hunt and have not completed the course. This course is good for life. It has to be completed only one time. Other states may require that a hunter complete a Hunter Safety or Education Course before hunting there. This course meets the requirements necessary for hunting out of state. Additional information in regards to Hunter Education: If you were born on or after September 2, 1971, and you are: -age 17 and over, you must successfully complete a hunter education course to hunt -age 12 through 16, you must successfully complete a hunter education course or be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older when hunting under 12 years of age, you must be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older when hunting. You are not old enough to take the course and be certified. Hunters, regardless of age, need to purchase a hunting license and any stamp endorsements needed and must carry them with him or her at all times while hunting. Upon completion of the Hunter Education Course, you will receive proof that you have completed the course. This proof of certification is required to be on your person, along with your hunting license, while hunting. It is not required to purchase a license. Vietnam Vets walk for awareness

On September 19, Commander of the Texas Viet-Nam Veterans Tony Santos and his wife Celinda Santos made a stop in Brackettville to rest during Operation USA Proud, a veterans awareness walk.

Santos served in the United States Army and was in Vietnam in 1967 where he suffered harsh injuries and was told he would be unable to walk again.

Santos not only learned to walk again, but is now leading a walk from Houston to Del Rio to raise awareness and to demonstrate his love and respect for his country.

This 340 mile walk began in Houston on September 11, to honor those who lost their lives

when America was attacked by terrorists in 2001.

The long walk ended with a police escort on September 21, National Prisoners of War, Missing in Action Day (POW/MIA), at Laughlin Air Force Base (LAFB).

At Laughlin, his group awarded the mothers and families of Raymond Losano, Oscar Saucedo, Jr. and Jose Lanzarin with the Gold Star Mothers Flag Award, all soldiers that have recently died in service.

This flag is presented to mothers who have lost their children while serving their country.

Congressman Ciro D. Rodriguez and representatives from LAFB were all in attendance.

Who has the pool now?

Kinney County Commissioner's Court postponed canceling the controversial pool lease with the City of Brackettville during a regular meeting on September 17.

Once again, Commissioners discussed postponing their decision until information regarding damages, missing equipment and costs to repair the pool can be assessed.

The City of Brackettville requested the lease of the County pool be cancelled in March of this year. The county replied with a letter dated August 6, that stated the Commissioner's Court, "would be open to mutual termination of the lease, if the City would provide, at no charge, wa-

ter for the swimming pool for as long as it is in existence, but not to exceed ten (10) years."

The city responded with a request for an itemized list of damages, lost property and expenses.

According to City Hall, it would initially cost \$145,510 to fill the pool at a rate of \$10.00 for the first 3,000 gallons, plus \$1.50 for each additional 1,000 gallon units, making the total expense for the city \$1,455,100 over 10 years.

The City also stated it is still waiting to receive an itemized list of damages from the county.

The one question that still remains unanswered is if the commissioners will ever even open the pool and if so, will it remain open for the 10 years the county is requesting free water.

Are your children safe at school?

Did you know that if a student assaults your child, according to the school administrators, she should really consider not defending herself as it may lead to a severe punishment if they do? It does not matter that your child did not provoke or throw the first punch, or even if your child immediately runs to the principals office to advise him of the situation and asks for assistance due to a bloody nose and pulled hair.

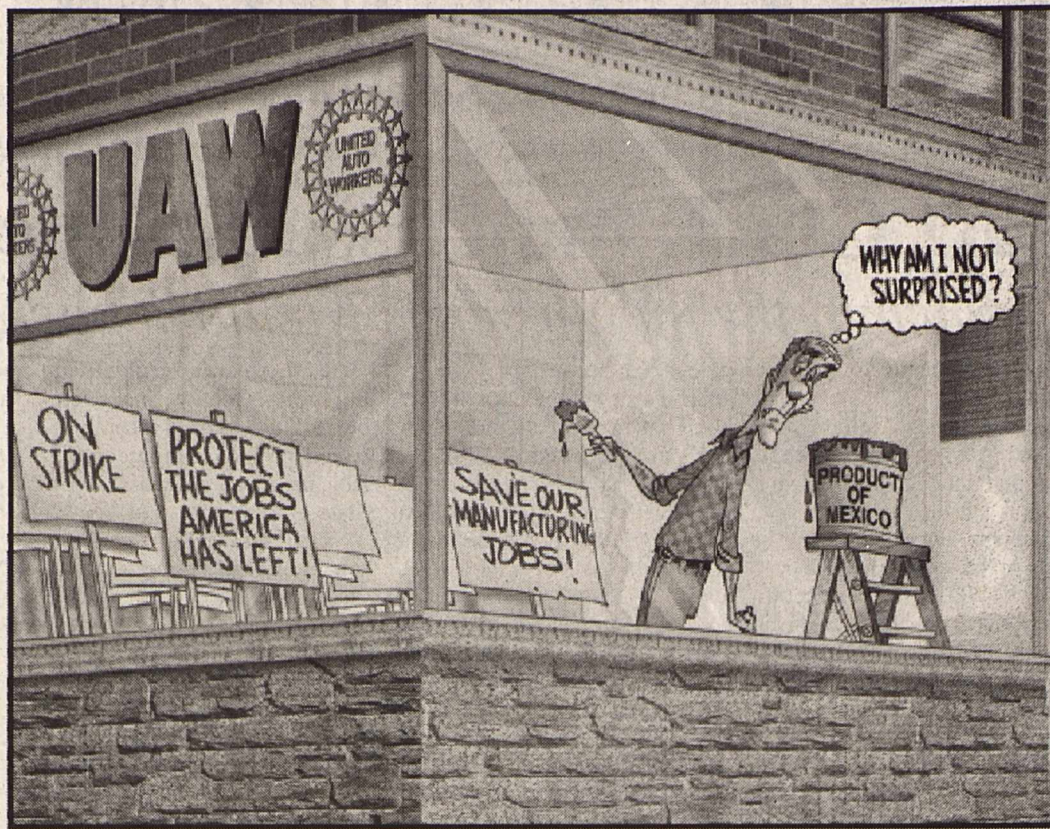
The school wants to hold our young children to such high standards leaving no room for error even if they as adults cannot do the same. Your child will not be looked at as a victim to an Assault (as defined by their Code of Conduct and Texas Penal Code) but instead interrogated about all possible things she should have done without prior knowledge. It's so easy for them to second guess what a young person should have done after she gets her face sucker punched and hair pulled.

Also, don't think it matters if she's been on the honor roll all her school years, participates in their school functions and activities, plays sports, never been in trouble, and gets nothing but praise from all her teachers. IT JUST DOESN'T MATTER because while in their school our kids do not have the right to defend themselves even though there is no faculty around to protect them.

I encourage everyone to read your Code of Conduct as it gives the definition of what constitutes an assault or self-defense. If they cannot protect my kid, then don't punish her when she needs to protect herself because of your lack of guidance.

Also, you can expect that she will get the same or in our case, worse punishment than the one who assaulted her. HOW'S THAT FOR JUSTICE?

The Right "Papers" - at the Right Time - Can Protect Your Family

To protect your family, you need more than the best intentions - you need the right "paperwork." And you're going to need it during two distinct phases of your life - your working years and your retirement.

Apart from life insurance, you may need another important document - a disability insurance policy. An injury or illness that prevents you from working can seriously erode your savings and investments, so you'll want to protect your income. Your employer may offer some type of group disability plan. But if this plan doesn't pay at least 60 percent of your income, doesn't pay benefits to age 65 and has a waiting period longer than your savings can last, you may need to look at supplemental private disability insurance.

Retirement Years

When you retire, you'll still need to protect your family, but at this stage of your life, your focus may be on leaving a legacy. Toward that goal, you will have some estate planning considerations. And estate plans can be complex, so you will need to work with an attorney.

Of course, everyone's situation is unique, but here are two of the most common documents associated with estate planning:

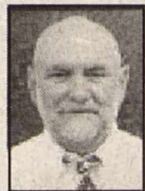
Will - If you don't have a will, your wishes may never be fully honored, because state law will dictate how your assets are divided. And if you have no living relatives, and you die intestate (without a will), your estate will go to the state.

Living Trust - If you only have a will, your assets may have to pass through probate - which can be time-consuming and expensive. But with a properly established living trust, your assets can pass directly to your beneficiaries, without court interference, legal fees, lengthy delays and public disclosure. Also, a living trust can give you more precise control over how - and when - you want your assets distributed. You could, for example, have money distributed to your children or grandchildren in installments, over a period of years.

As you can see, you need to have your "papers" in order to properly take care of your family - no matter where you are on life's journey.

How much life insurance should I have?

Last week, we introduced the need for life insurance planning. So now you may be wondering just how much life insurance should be purchased? Just what makes up a good life insurance plan? There are 5 primary reasons an individual should purchase life insurance: final expenses, debt liquidation, housing, education, and income replacement.

None of us wants to think about it, but each of us will incur final expenses. The most obvious of these is the burial expense. This may even include transportation costs if the death occurs at a distance from the chosen burial site. Less obvious expenses may include those associated with medical treatment for a fatal illness or accident. There are even costs involved in the process of

the pronouncement of death by a medical professional and the subsequent issuance of a death certificate by a government agency.

Many of us would like to leave our families debt free at the time of our deaths. This may include consumer credit for items like furniture and appliances, automobiles, etc. We may also consider credit card debt in this category.

A family left without a breadwinner will still need housing. If there is a mortgage we can include an amount to pay its remaining balance. If housing is rented we can include an amount to pay rent for a reasonable time period while the family adjusts to the new financial circumstances.

If there are minor children in the household or if there is a spouse whose education is incomplete, we should consider an amount to pay the completion of their studies. Part 3 of 5: The Freedom of Religion

Did you know that you have two freedoms granted by the First Amendment regarding Religion? Pilgrims were called Separatists back in England because

they wanted independence from the established Church of England. In 1620, they sailed the stormy Atlantic for 63 days on the tiny Mayflower, seeking freedom of religion in the New World. The First Amendment contains two clauses about the Freedom of Religion. The first part is known as the Establishment Clause, and the second as the Free Exercise Clause. The Establishment Clause prohibits the government from passing laws that will establish an official religion or preferring one religion over another. The courts have interpreted the establishment clause to accomplish the separation of church and state. The Free Exercise Clause prohibits the government from interfering with a person's practice of his or her religion. However,

religious actions and rituals can be limited by civil and federal laws. Religious freedom is an absolute right, and includes the right to practice any religion of one's choice, or no religion at all, and to do this without government control.

Your right to Freedom of Religion and the free exercise thereof means:

The Freedom of Religion is an inalienable right

The First Amendment provides for the Freedom of Religion for all Americans

The Free Exercise Clause provides that government will neither control nor prohibit the free exercise of one's religion.

The government will remain neutral. So, go ahead and pray - or don't. Go to church - or sleep in. It's up to you.

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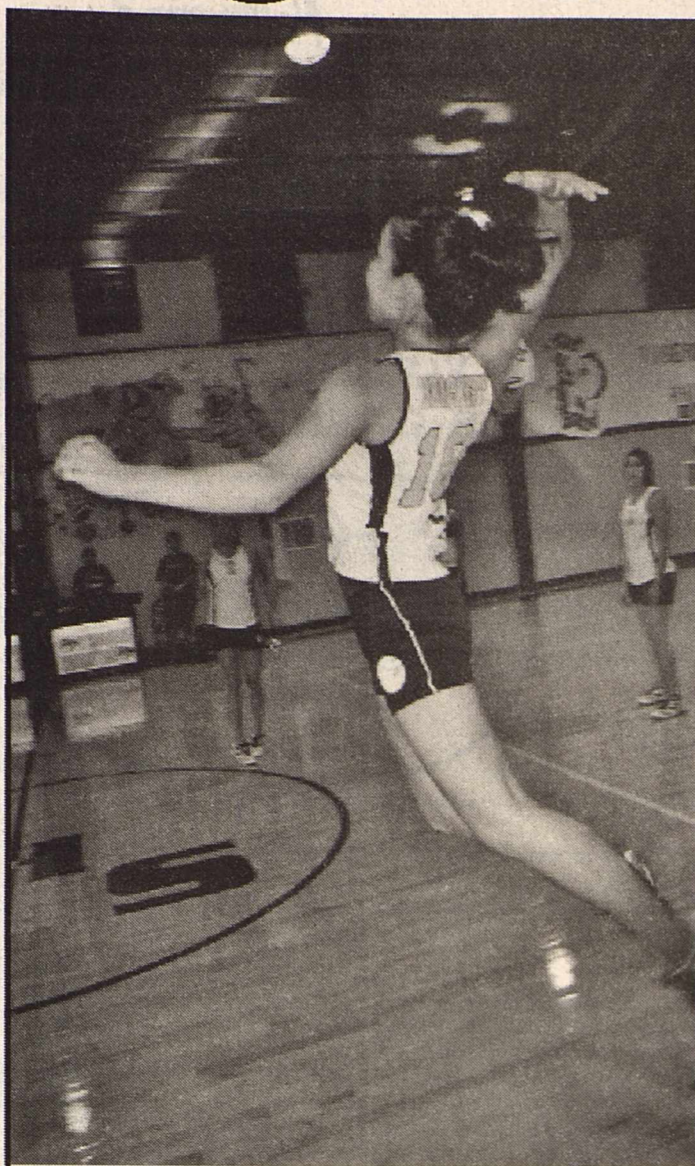

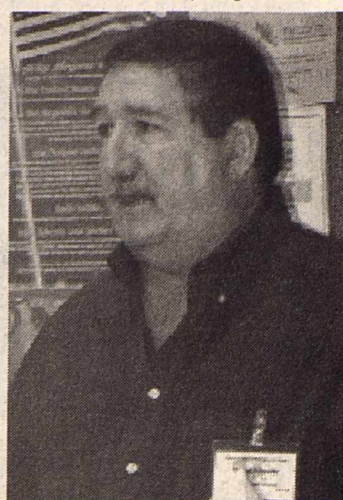

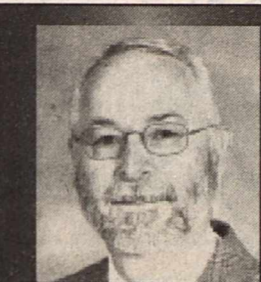

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King announces aerospace program

AUSTIN, Texas - Representative Tracy O. King is pleased to announce that the 2007-2008 High School Aerospace Scholars Program is now accepting applications.

King encourages students to look into the program for the opportunity to experience NASA as it prepares for future space exploration.

After selected students develop their math and science skills to complete 10 web-based assignments throughout the school year, they will spend a week during the summer at the Johnson Space Center in Houston and work with real NASA scientists and engineers to investigate options for sending humans to Mars.

Students must meet the following criteria to be eligible:

Be a U.S. citizen, a Texas resident, and currently a high school junior

Have an interest in science, math, or engineering

Be able to commit to a relationship with the Johnson Space Center, including a one-week residential experience during the summer

Have access to the Internet and to e-mail (home, school, or public library)

The state of Texas, in partnership with the Johnson Space Center and the Texas educational community, developed High School Aerospace Scholars in 1999 to encourage more students to pursue careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

More than 1,900 students from across Texas have participated in the program.

Additional partners include the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, University of Houston system, and Rotary NASA.

Apple Caramel Cheesecake Pie

- 1 8in graham pie crust
- 1 can (21 oz.) apple pie filling, divided
- 1 pkg. (8 oz) cream cheese, softened.
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 tsp. lemon juice
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 cup caramel ice cream topping
- 1/3 cup pecans, toasted
- Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

Place crust on baking sheet, spread half of filling in crust. Set aside.

Using large mixing bowl,

beat cream cheese, sugar, lemon, and vanilla until fluffy.

Add eggs, one at a time, mixing after each addition.

Pour filling on top of apple layer.

Bake for 30-35 min.. or until the center is set and let cool.

Prior to serving, garnish (in this order) with remaining apple filling, caramel sundae syrup, and optional toasted pecans.

Helpful Hint:

Spread out pecans evenly on

a baking sheet. Place into a 375 degrees F oven for 3-5 minutes or until pecans are well toasted.

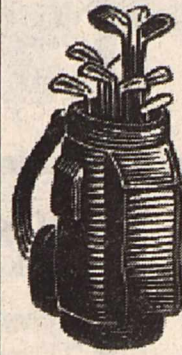

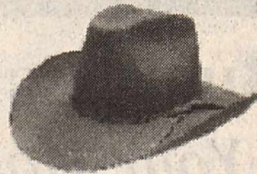
